#### South Africa - Weather

Much of South Africa will remain drier biased during the next two weeks
O Areas from Western Cape and western Northern Cape through Eastern
Cape will still have a few opportunities for rain
Portions of southwest Western Cape will receive 0.50 to 2.00
inches of rain by next Wednesday morning
Rainfall elsewhere will range from a trace to 0.50 inch most often


Dry conditions will persist for Free State and neighboring areas during the next two weeks
O The winter wheat produced in these areas will remain dormant or semidormant and will not be significantly impacted by the dryness
These areas will otherwise need to see timely rain this spring to support aggressive development


Many areas in southwest Western Cape will receive enough rain to bolster soil moisture during the next two weeks
O However, additional rain will be needed to completely reverse the moisture deficits in most winter wheat areas.



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
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
#### **United States of America - Weather**


U.S. MIDWEST: Little rain through the next ten days to two weeks and hot temperatures for several days this week will cause significant drying and rising levels of crop


stress from the southwestern Corn Belt into central Illinois. Yield potentials for late-planted soybeans should decline while most crops that were planted near the normal dates may see rising levels of stress as well, but serious declines in yield potentials may not occur for a

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: The Delta and the Southeast will see a seasonable pattern of isolated to scattered showers each day during the next two weeks that will slow drying rates and maintain favorable conditions for crops in most areas. Many areas will dry down overall after Barry's exit, but with the timely showers expected and subsoil moisture in place, most crops should continue to develop favorably.










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



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

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
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
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
## Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: Restricted precipitation and net-drying will occur today and Thursday in most of Europe o The greatest rain will occur in the Alps region while other locations receive totals no more than 0.25 inch most often. Rain will increase over the U.K., Germany, Poland into Hungary and northern Romania Friday through Sunday. Most of the rain will be light and erratic and daily moisture totals will vary from 0.65 to A.65 inch and U.S. in Carelly more.

AUSTRALIA: Drought stricken areas in Queensland and northern New South Wales are expected to receive no "significant" precipitation for at least the next two weeks and wheat, barley and canola production will continue to struggle. Rain may return to coastal locations in Queensland late in the outlook, but very little rain will occur the next ten days. Erratic and brief showers may occur in southeast Queensland Sunday into Monday. A few showers may start to occur Saturday and linger into Tuesday.









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
