South Africa - Weather

Southern and eastern South Africa will have opportunities for rain over the weekend into the first part of next week
 Free State and neighboring areas will remain critically dry during the next two weeks
 Any rain that occurs will be too light to counter evaporation
 Winter wheat will remain dormant or semi-dormant in most locations
 A significant boost in rain is still needed to support better wheat development
 Portions of Western Cape will receive enough rain to bolster soil moisture during the next two weeks
 However, the main winter wheat areas will not receive enough rain to completely reverse the moisture deficits
 Additional precipitation will be needed to support better winter wheat growth
 Temperatures will trend near normal through next Wednesday

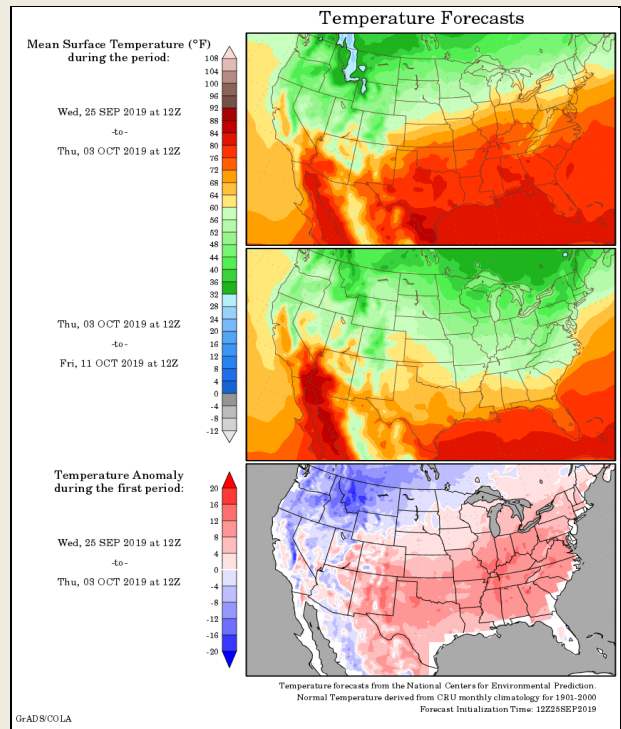
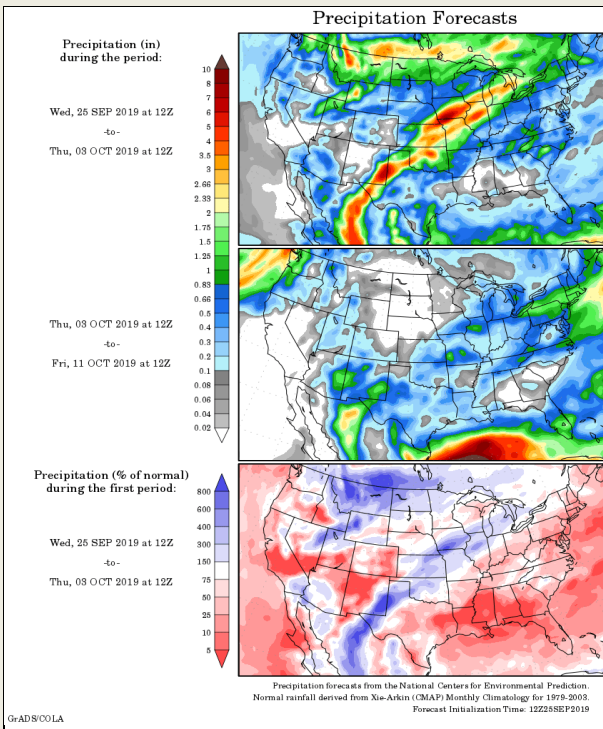
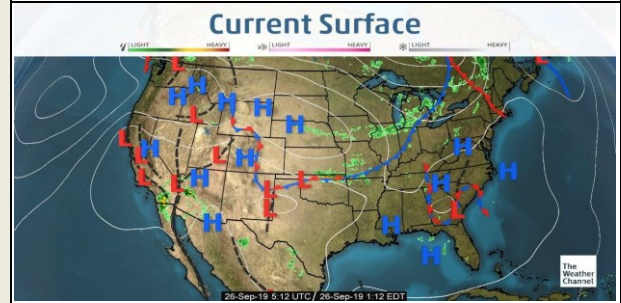
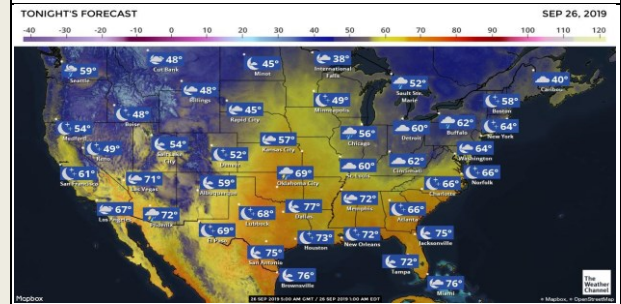
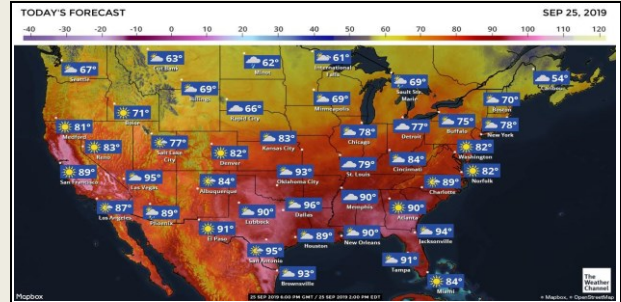
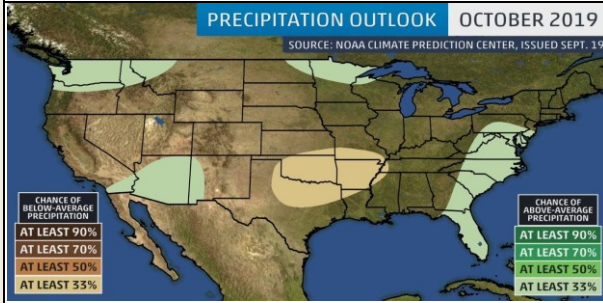


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United States of America - Weather

U.S. MIDWEST: An unsettled weather pattern will prevail in parts of the northern and western Corn Belt through the next week with waves of rain expected. Temperatures will be mild to warm, but the wet bias will keep crop maturation rates slow at times. The best drying conditions will be in the lower eastern Midwest. There is potential for frost and freezes in northwestern Corn Belt next week, but confidence in the intensity of the cold is not very high and the situation will be closely monitored. The coldest weather is expected in the second half of next week leaving plenty of time for the outlook to change. Early indications suggest frost will occur in Minnesota, Wisconsin, the Dakotas and northern Nebraska with freezes most likely from the Dakotas into a part of Minnesota.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: Erratically distributed rainfall is expected through the next ten days. The environment will be very good for summer crop maturation and harvesting, although there will be some brief delays when showers evolve. The environment will also be good for some of the late season crops, although rainfall is not likely to be great enough to counter evaporation.

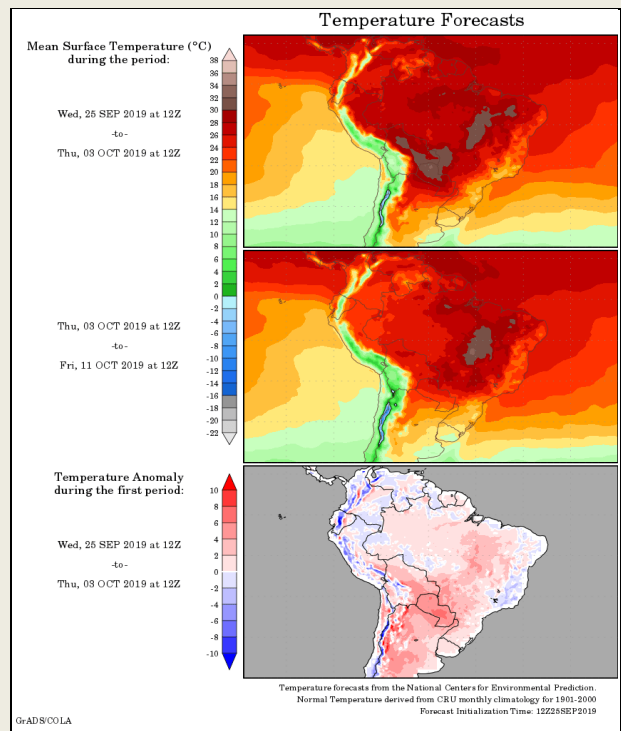
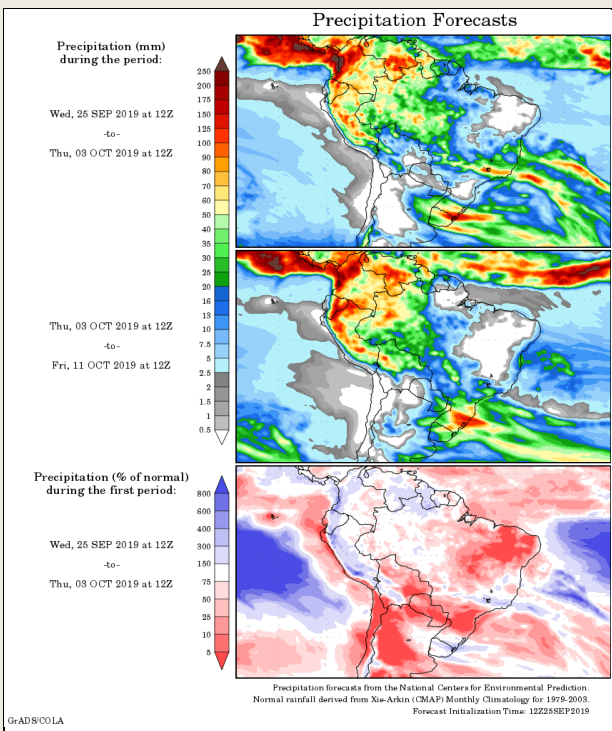
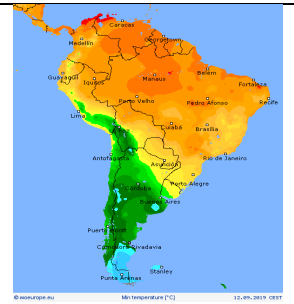
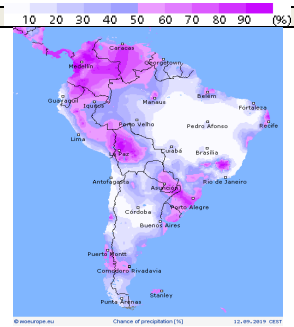
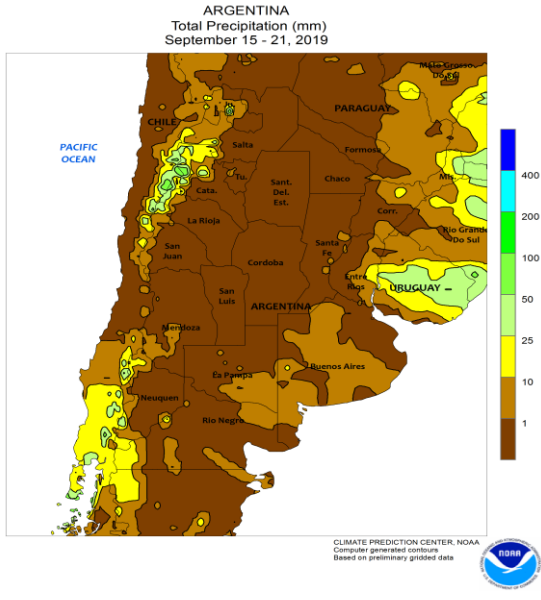


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South America - Weather

BRAZIL: Much needed rain will fall this week from Paraguay and Mato Grosso do Sul to Minas Gerais, Espírito Santo and Rio de Janeiro tonight into Friday. The moisture will improve corn and soybean planting and establishment conditions across the region, although the greatest rain will be in Sao Paulo and Minas Gerais. Dry and warm weather will return next week and that might support quick drying, but follow up moisture will be needed soon to support quick germination and emergence.

ARGENTINA: Dry weather will dominate western Argentina in the next seven days raising more concern about the condition of winter wheat which is stressed because of dryness. The environment will also delay the onset of cotton, corn and sunseed planting. Rain that evolves next week in Buenos Aires could relax the concern, but more rain will be needed. Eastern Argentina rainfall will be sufficient in the coming week to improve crop and field conditions

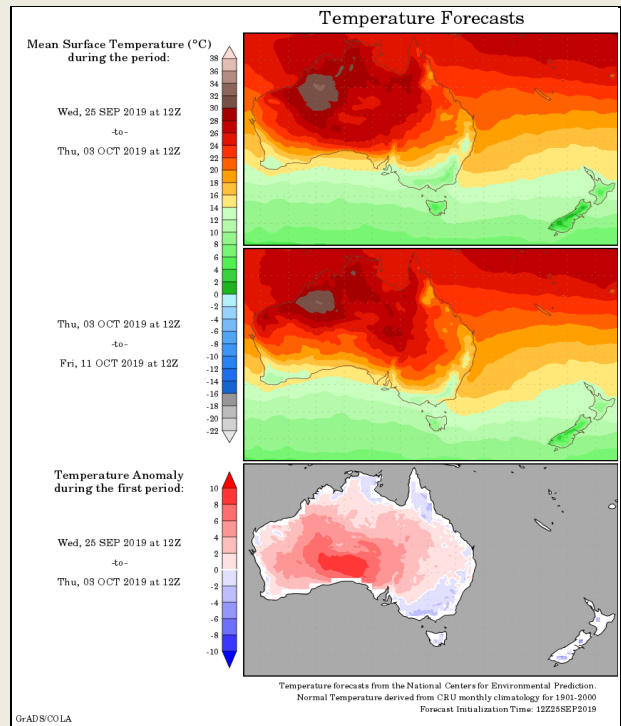
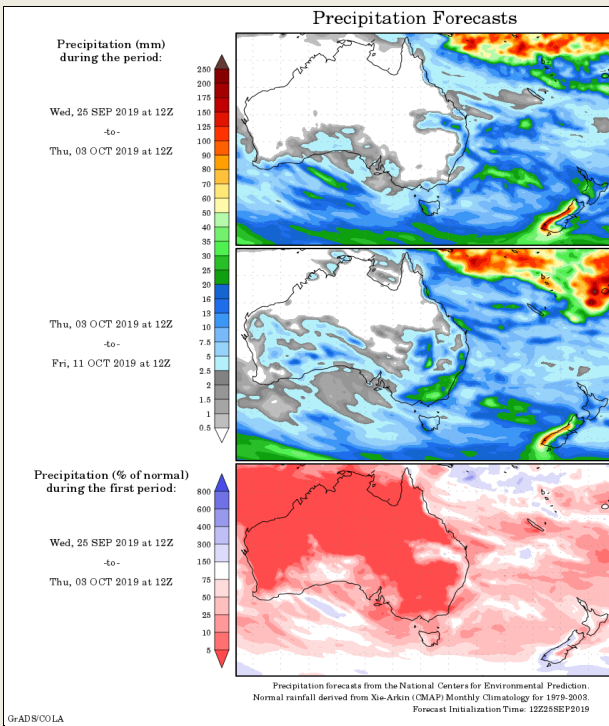
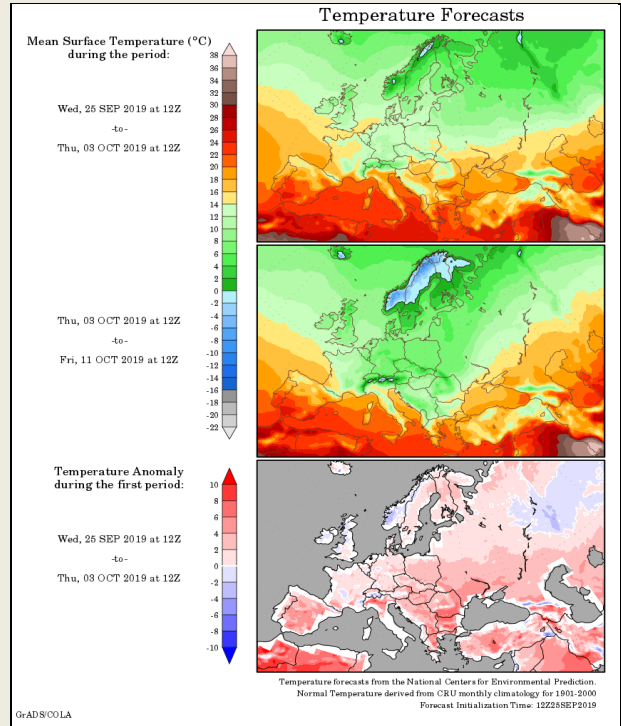
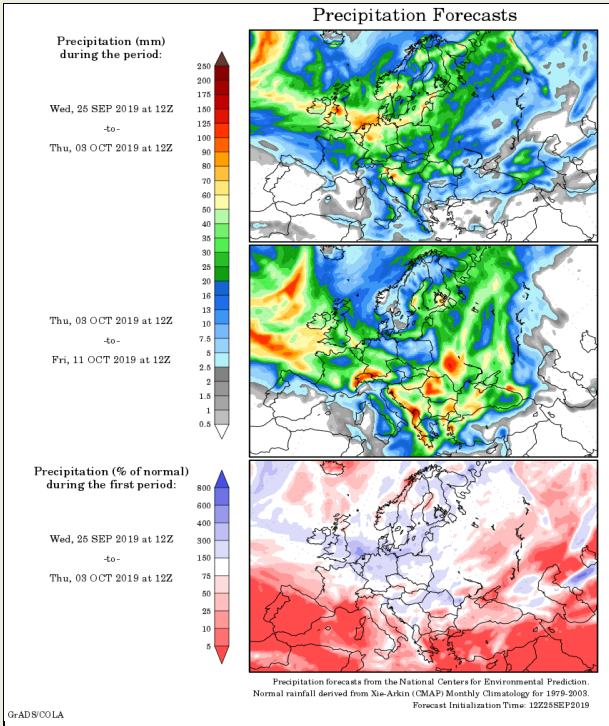


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Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

EUROPE: Improving precipitation will occur over north and central France into Germany as well as the U.K. into Scandinavia this week. The moisture will be beneficial and will bolster soil moisture conditions for winter crop planting and establishment in France and immediate surrounding areas in Belgium, the Netherlands, west Germany and southeast U.K.

AUSTRALIA: Restricted precipitation and drought will continue over most of western and central New South Wales into Queensland the next ten days to two weeks. Winter crop development will remain poor and a reduction in cotton, sorghum, corn and other crops will be possible if drought prevails into October.



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
