

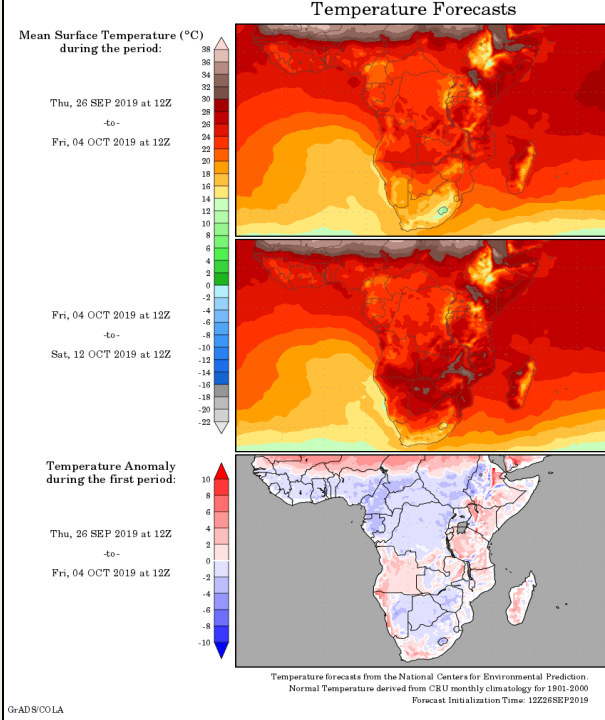
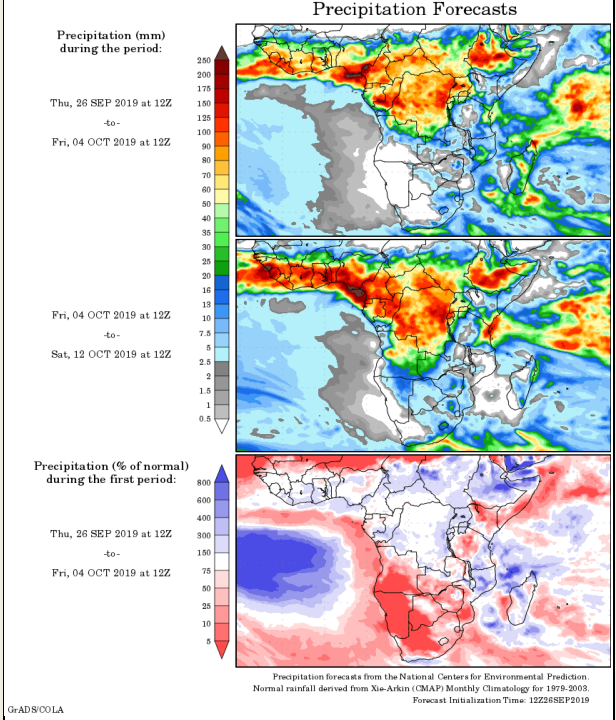
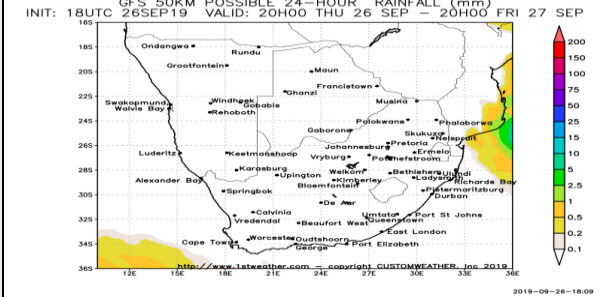
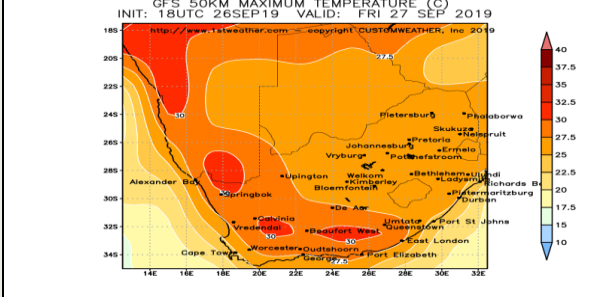
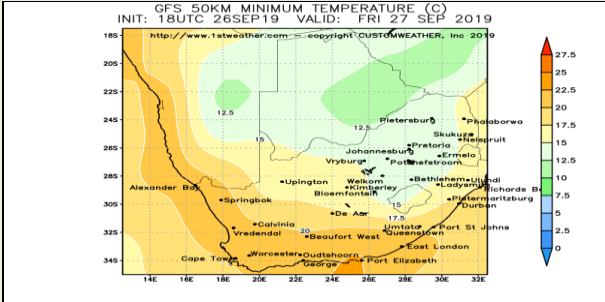
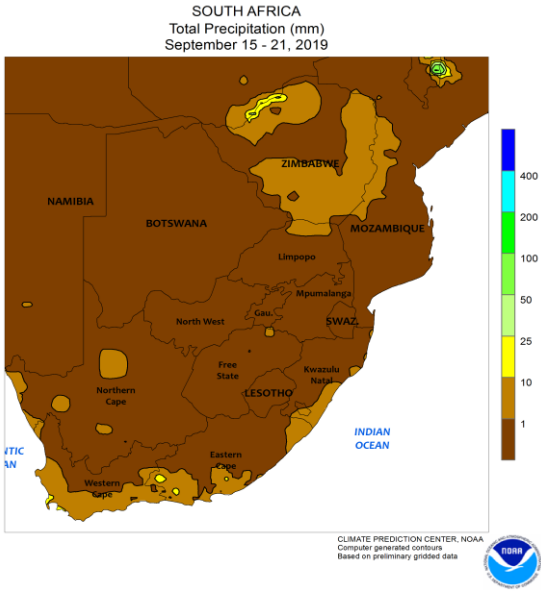


Weather Report

27 September 2019

South Africa - Weather

- Rainfall during the next two weeks will be too light to impact long-term soil conditions for Free State and neighboring areas
- o Soil moisture will remain critically short
- o Winter wheat will remain dormant or semi-dormant in most locations
- o Most production areas will need to see significant rainfall soon to support wheat development
- Portions of Western Cape will receive enough rain to bolster soil moisture during the next two weeks
- o However, the main winter wheat areas will not receive enough rain to completely reverse the moisture deficits
- o Additional precipitation will be needed to support better winter wheat growth



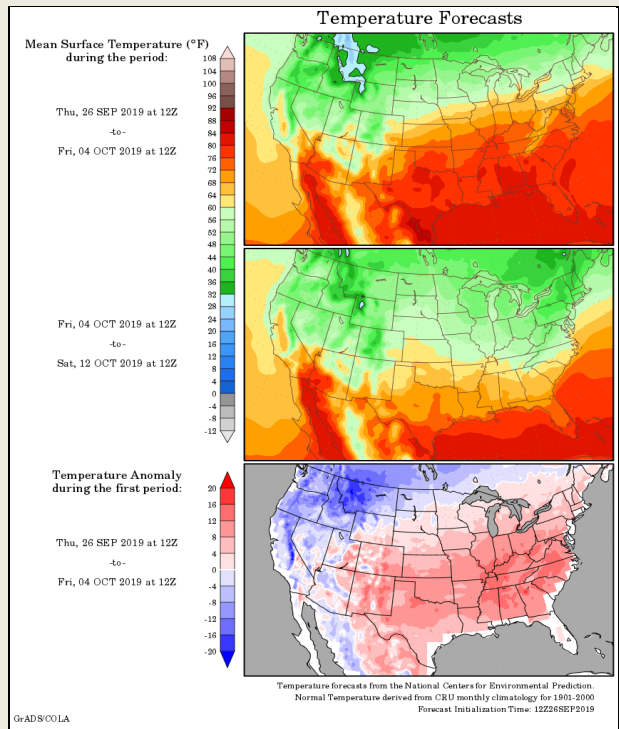
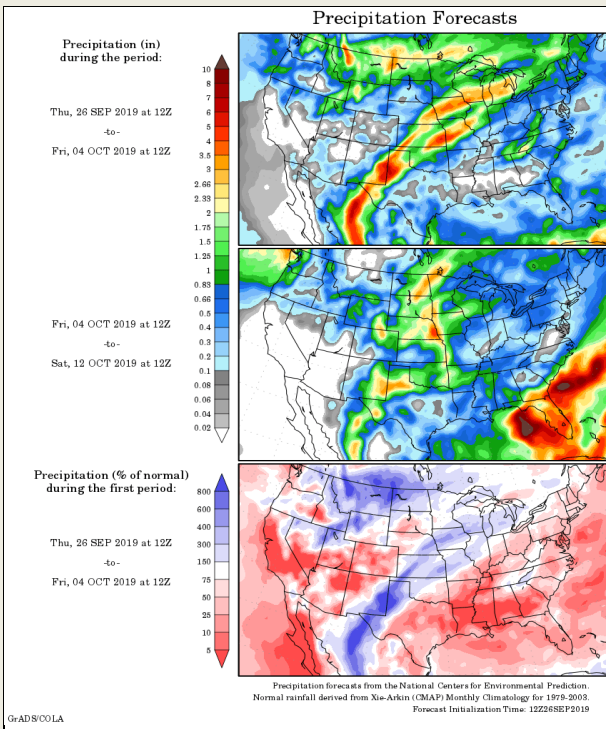
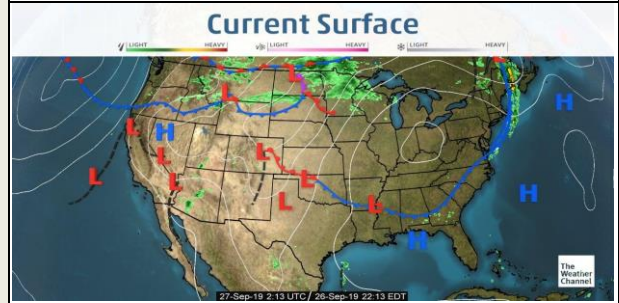
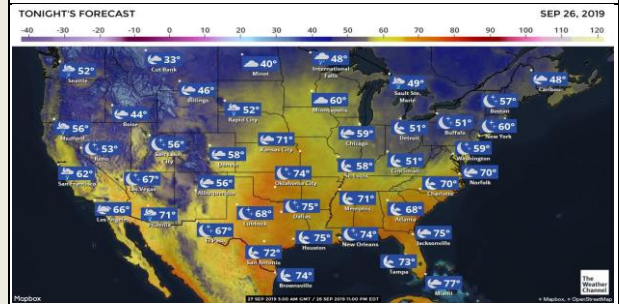
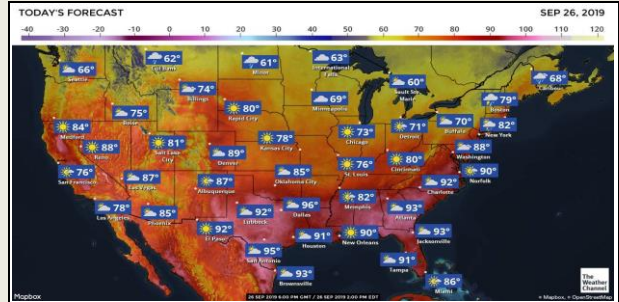
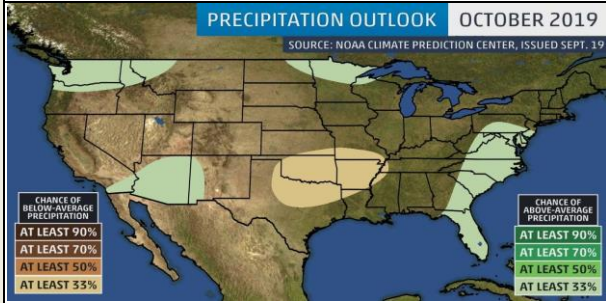
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United States of America - Weather

U.S. MIDWEST: Regular rounds of showers and thunderstorms will occur through the next week causing interruptions to fieldwork while breaks between rounds of rain should allow for at least some fieldwork to advance with the best conditions for fieldwork from southeastern Missouri to Ohio and Kentucky where little rain is expected.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: The two-week outlook still favors crop maturation and harvesting across the Delta and the Southeast as a restricted rainfall pattern will remain in place while some immature crops suffer from a lack of soil moisture.

A few showers will occur on occasion and the resulting rain will be welcome where crops are immature, but many areas will not receive enough rain to have a significant impact on soil moisture or conditions for fieldwork.

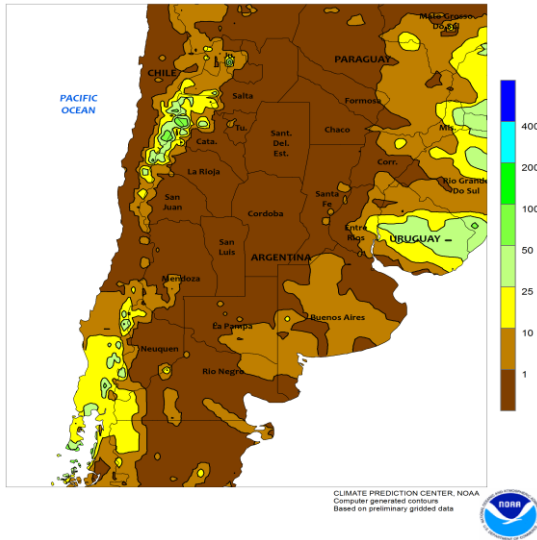


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South America - Weather

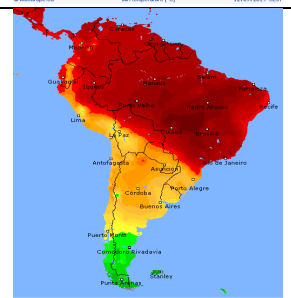
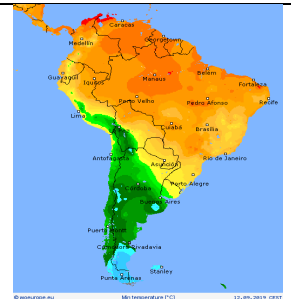
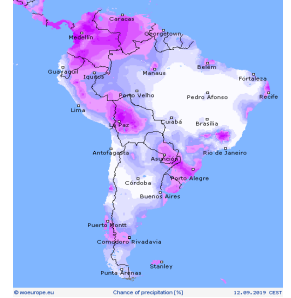
BRAZIL: Much of Brazil still needs rain to improve conditions for summer crop planting and a gradual improving trend is expected through the next two weeks.
 o Regular rounds of showers and thunderstorms will occur in Mato Grosso and although much of the rain will be light, some pockets of greater rain and improving conditions for planting will occur.
ARGENTINA: Eastern Argentina will see some timely rain Sunday into Wednesday, but outside of that event, a restricted rainfall pattern will remain in place most often through the next two weeks and much of the country will be left in need of greater rain to improve conditions for winter wheat and summer crop planting.
 o Rain Sunday into Wednesday will be greatest in Entre Rios and nearby areas where totals will be 0.30-1.30" and locally while most other areas from Buenos Aires to Corrientes receive up to 0.30" and locally more.

September 15 - 21, 2019

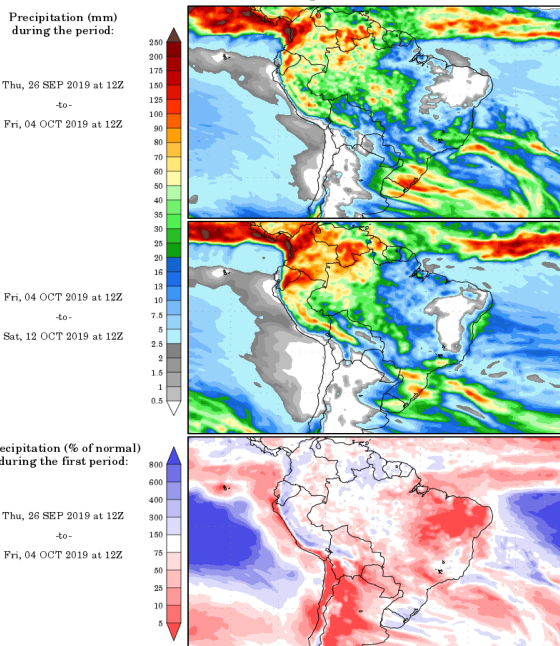

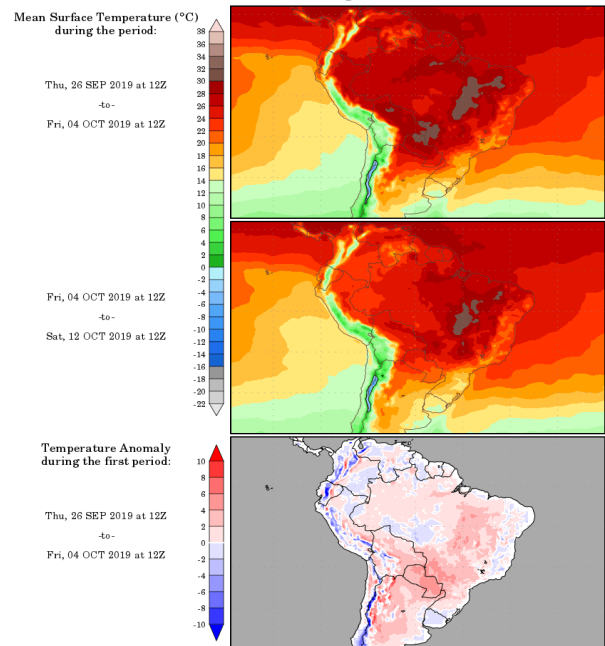


Precipitation Forecasts

Temperature Forecasts



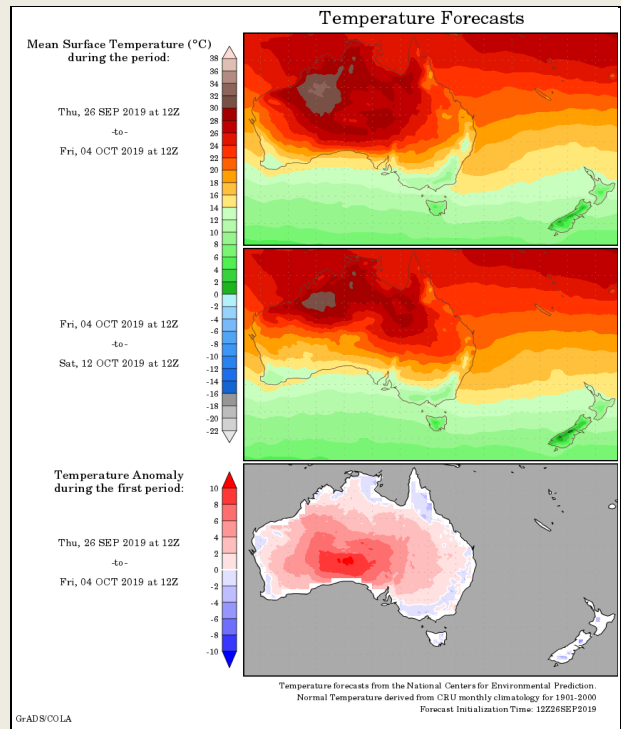
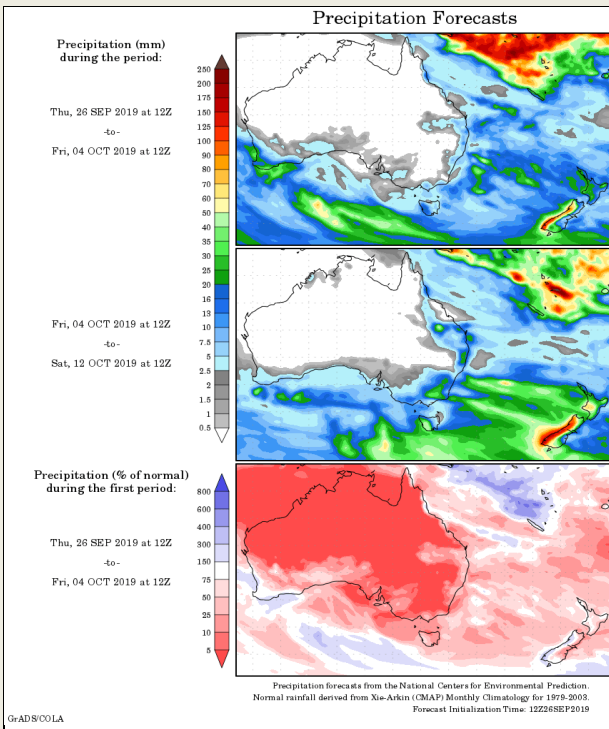
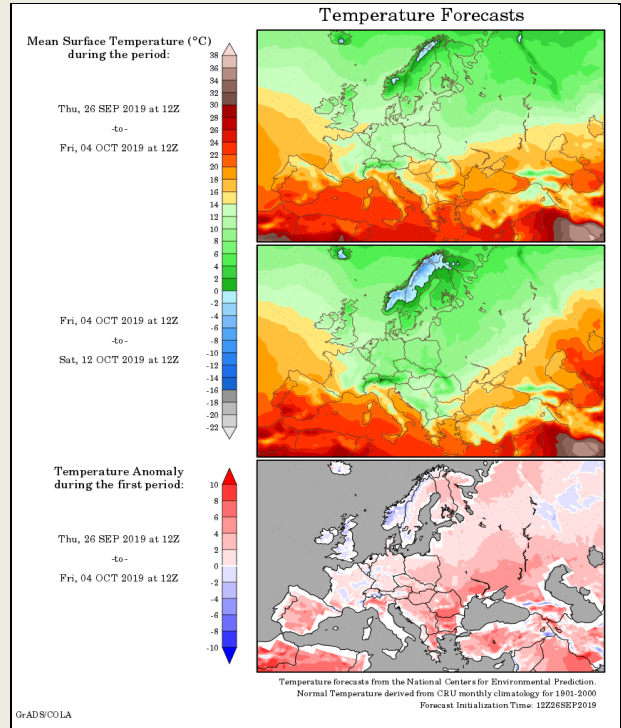
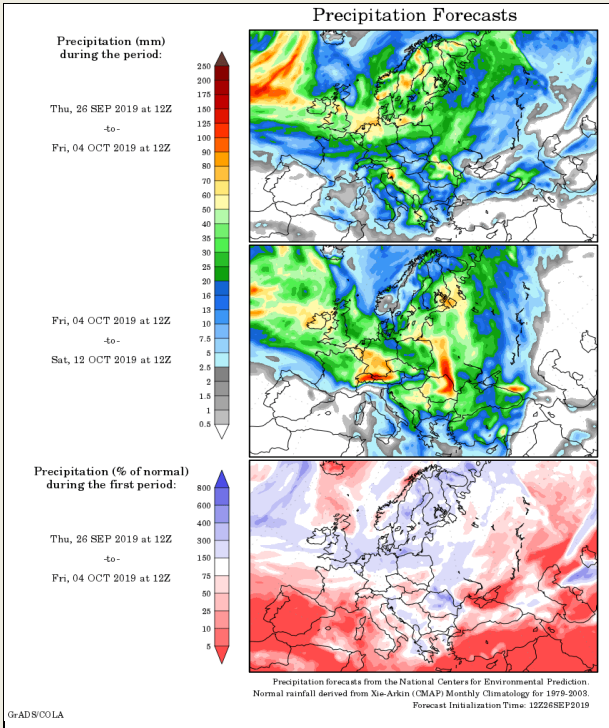
Temperature forecasts from the National Centers for Environmental Prediction.

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Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

EUROPE: Improving precipitation will occur over north and central France into Germany as well as the U.K. into Scandinavia this week. The moisture will be beneficial and will bolster soil moisture conditions for winter crop planting and establishment in France and immediate surrounding areas in Belgium, the Netherlands, west Germany and southeast U.K.

AUSTRALIA: Restricted precipitation and drought will continue over most of western and central New South Wales into Queensland the next ten days to two weeks. Winter crop development will remain poor and a reduction in cotton, sorghum, corn and other crops will be possible if drought prevails into October.



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
