









# **Weather Report**

# South Africa - Weather

- Free State and neighboring areas will remain dry or critically dry during the next two weeks
- Any rain that does occur will be unable to significantly impact long-term soil conditions
- Significant rain is still needed to improve the moisture profile and promote aggressive growth
- However, the environment will remain far from ideal in the coming weeks
- Western Cape will also remain too dry to support aggressive winter wheat development during the next two weeks
- A general soaking of rain will be needed toward the end of the month into early November to improve crop prospects









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# United States of America - Weather

**U.S. MIDWEST:** High winds and heavy snow will continue in the far northwestern Corn Belt into Saturday while freezing temperatures expand to the entire western Corn Belt and northern Illinois Saturday morning with some damage to immature corn likely to result from the cold. Hard freezes will occur from the eastern Dakotas, large parts of eastern Nebraska, and portions of northeastern Kansas to central and north-central Iowa and western Minnesota Saturday morning and some of the corn that is immature is likely to be damaged.

**U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST:** Highs today in the Delta will be in the 70s to the middle 80s with some middle and upper 60s in the north while the Southeast sees highs in the upper 70s and 80s with some lower to middle 70s in the north.

o Saturday's highs in the Delta will be in the upper 50s and 60s while the Southeast sees highs in the upper 60s through the 80s with some lower to middle 60s in the west.







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# Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

**EUROPE:** Rounds of precipitation will occur from the U.K., France through north Italy, Germany, the Czech Republic, Austria into Poland as well as Scandinavia this week. The greatest moisture will occur from France and the U.K. into the Netherlands and extreme northwest Germany into Scandinavia where totals will range from 0.75 to 1.50 inches and local totals exceeding 2.00 inches. The moisture will be welcome and help support winter crop development and establishment after extended dryness has impacted much of the nation this fall.

**AUSTRALIA:** Rainfall will increase over east New South Wales and east Queensland today into Saturday. The greatest precipitation will occur today. However, significant rainfall will be confined to coastal regions back into portions of Darling Downs, Queensland and the region of New England, New South Wales. The moisture will benefit some eastern production areas of southeast Queensland and northeast New South Wales, however, many interior locations will remain mostly dry and a greater soaking of rain will still be needed. Crop development will remain poor and stress will continue to grow and weigh down potentials of cotton, sorghum, corn and other crops of the region.



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
