

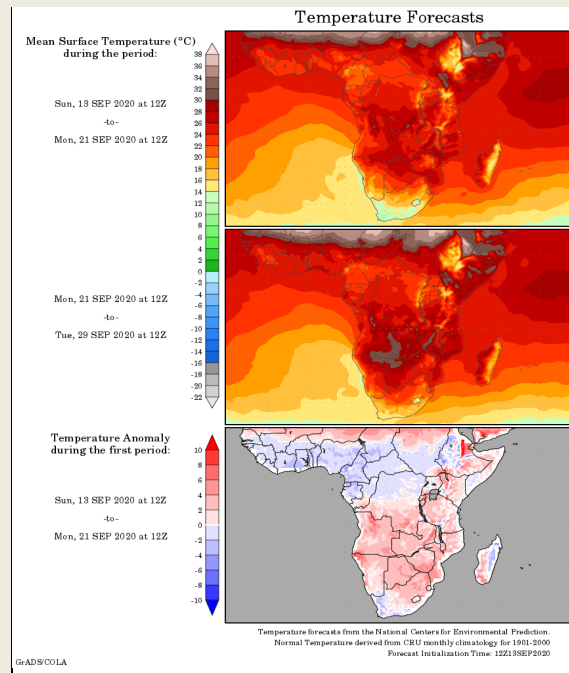
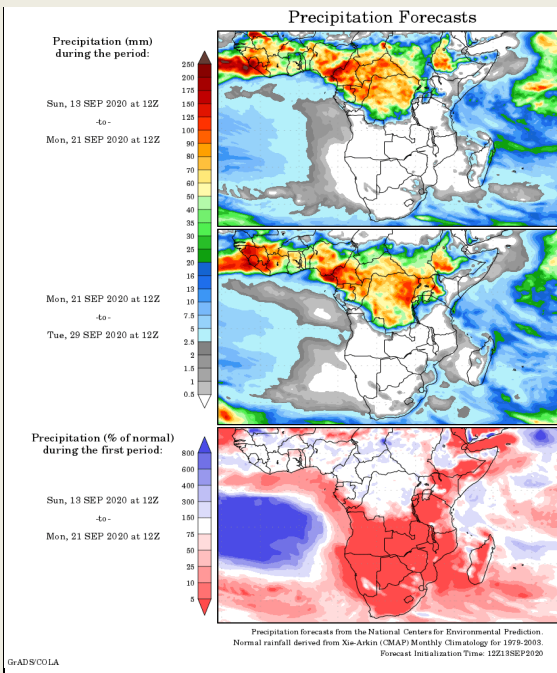
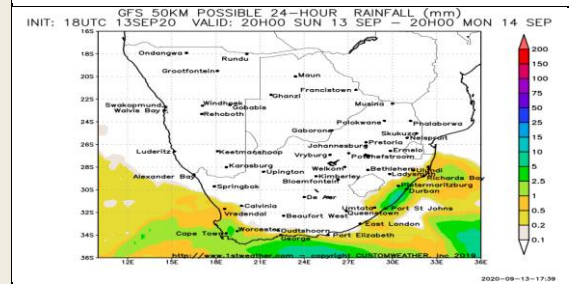
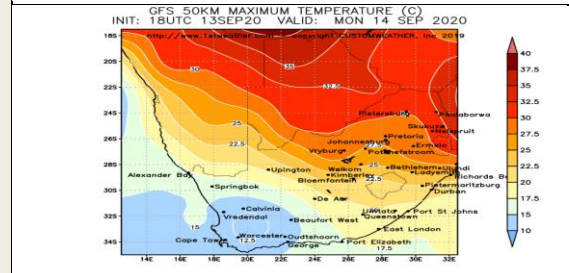
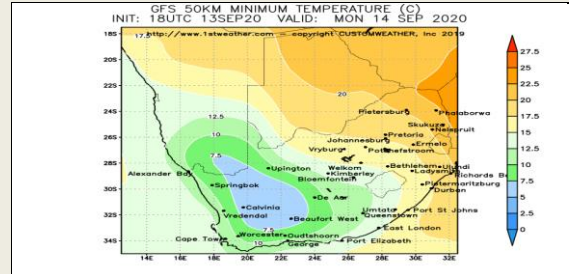
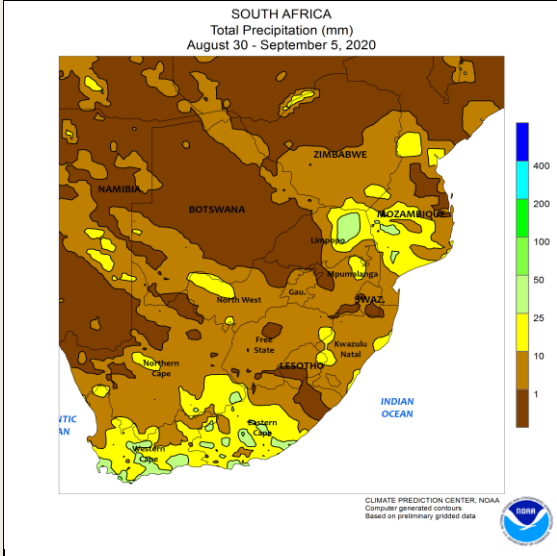


Weather Report

14 September 2020

South Africa - Weather

- Eastern South Africa will initially be drier biased through the end of the weekend
- o Rain will then gradually spread across the region next week
- o The rain will be enough to gradually bolster soil moisture, but will likely be too light to completely fix the moisture deficits
- o Additional rain will be needed to support better early season planting prospects
- Western South Africa will be drier biased during the next two weeks
- o Any rain that does occur will be lost to evaporation
- Western Cape will still have plenty of moisture to maintain aggressive winter wheat growth during the next two weeks despite the drying trend
- o Yields are expected to be good this year due to timely rain over the growing season
- o The small amount of rain-fed winter wheat in Free State and neighboring areas will be too dry to support aggressive growth in the next two weeks
- o Irrigated crops will develop under more favorable conditions in Free State, Northern Cape, and neighboring areas

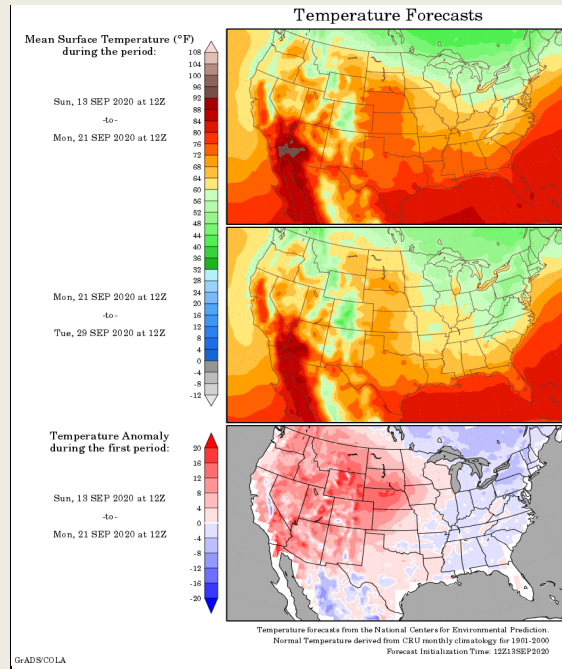
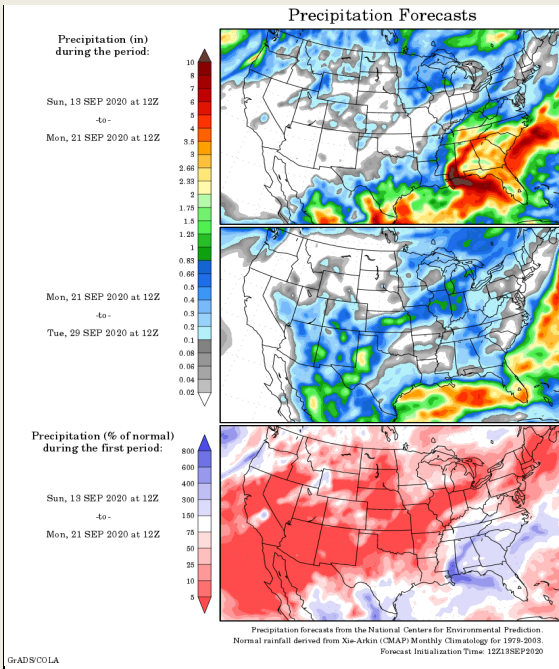
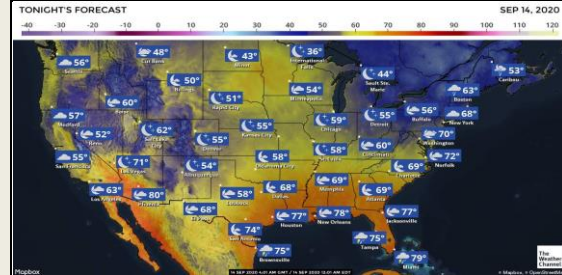
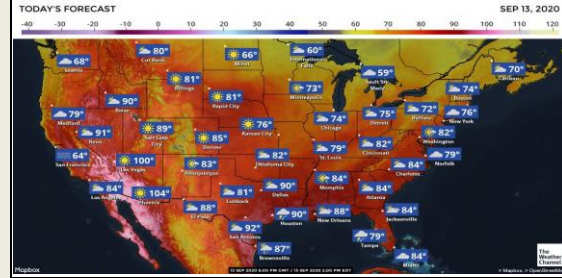
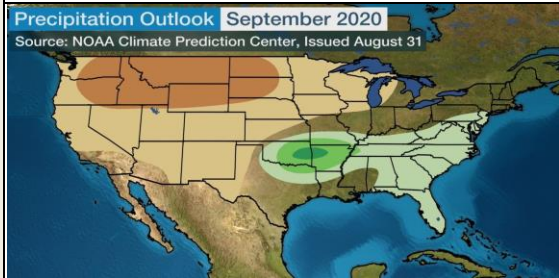


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United States of America - Weather

U.S. MIDWEST: Showers and thunderstorms will continue through Saturday bringing rain to nearly all of the Midwest including additional rain in the driest areas from eastern Nebraska into Iowa where further improvements in drought conditions will occur before a drier weather pattern occurs Sunday through Sep. 25 allowing crop maturation and harvesting to accelerate. The far northwestern Corn Belt as well as southeastern Missouri into central Indiana will be driest through Saturday and parts of that region will be left dry.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: Today's forecast is wetter for Florida into southeastern Mississippi, southern Alabama, and southwestern Georgia for Sunday into Wednesday as a tropical wave located near the Bahamas may become a tropical depression or tropical storm as it moves towards the region during the next several days. Outside of the impacts of the tropical wave, the southeastern states will see daily rounds of isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms through Sep. 19 that will slow harvesting, but most areas will see adequate breaks between rounds of rain to allow fieldwork to advance.

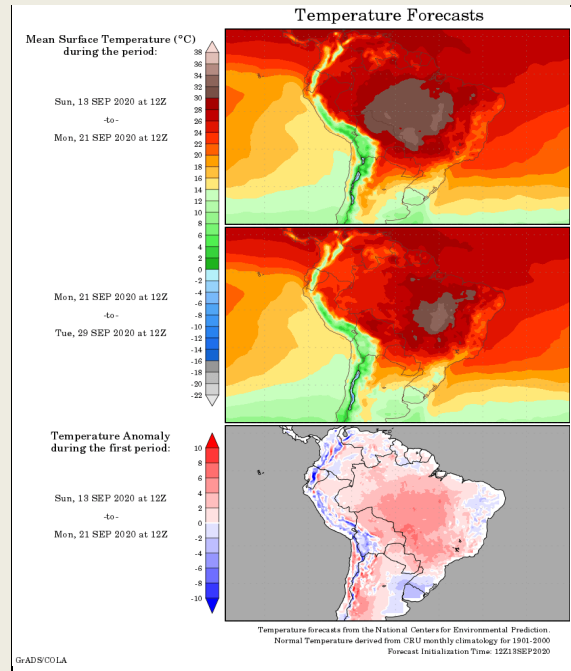
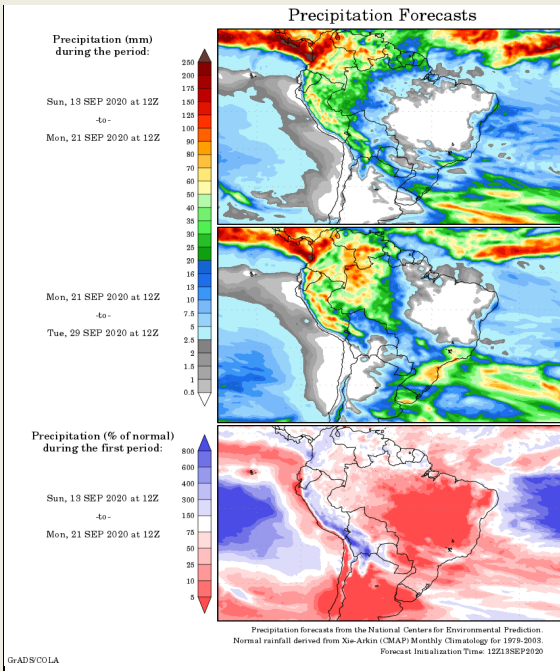
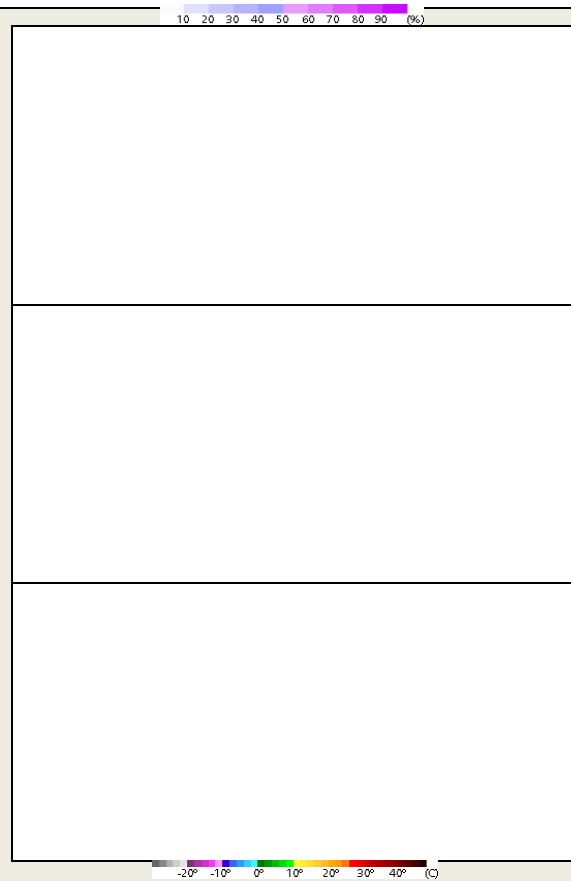
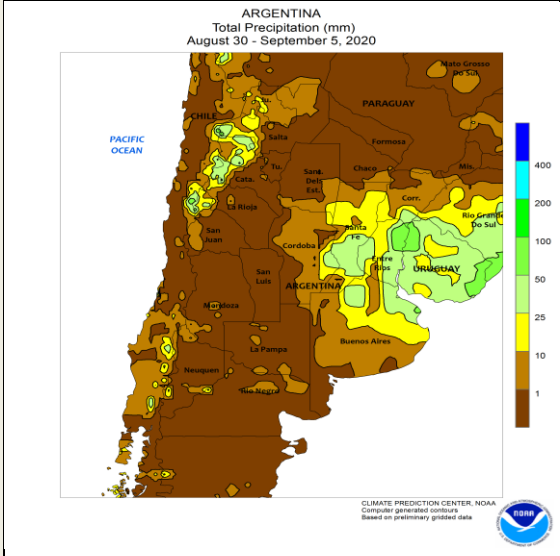


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South America - Weather

BRAZIL: Daily rounds of showers and thunderstorms will occur in Rio Grande do Sul through Wednesday with some rain extending into Santa Catarina and southern Paraguay on occasion and concerns over winter wheat quality declines may increase, but serious declines are not likely as most areas will see breaks between rounds of rain that allow wheat to dry down. Meanwhile, outside of some showers in eastern Bahia, the remainder of Brazil will see little to no rain of significance through next Wednesday before scattered showers develop most days from central and northern Paraguay to Parana and portions of Sao Paulo Sep. 17-20.

ARGENTINA: Outside of north-central and northeastern Argentina, much of the country will see little to no rain of significance through the next two weeks and many areas will be left in need of significant rain to induce improvements in soil moisture for summer crop planting as well as for winter wheat development.



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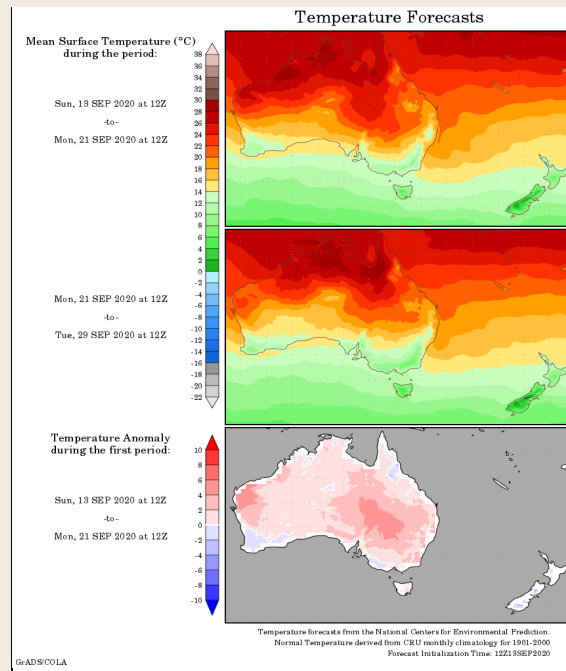
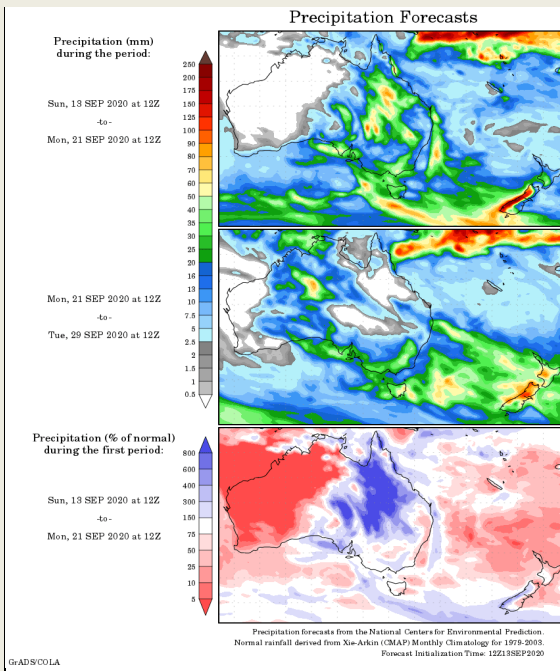
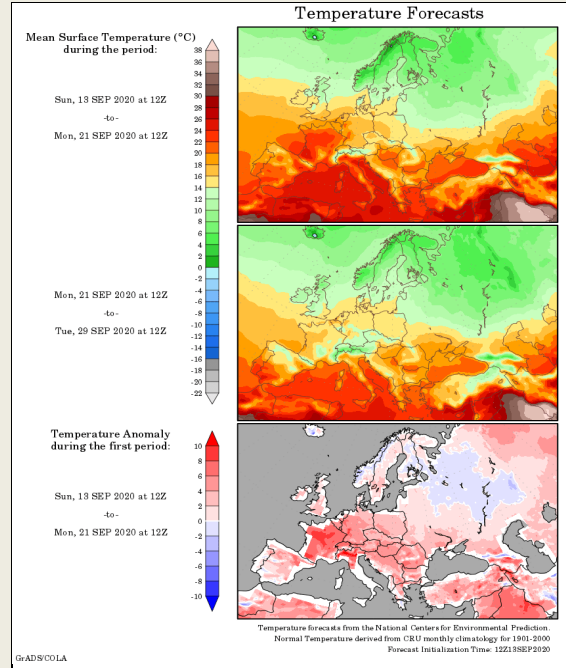
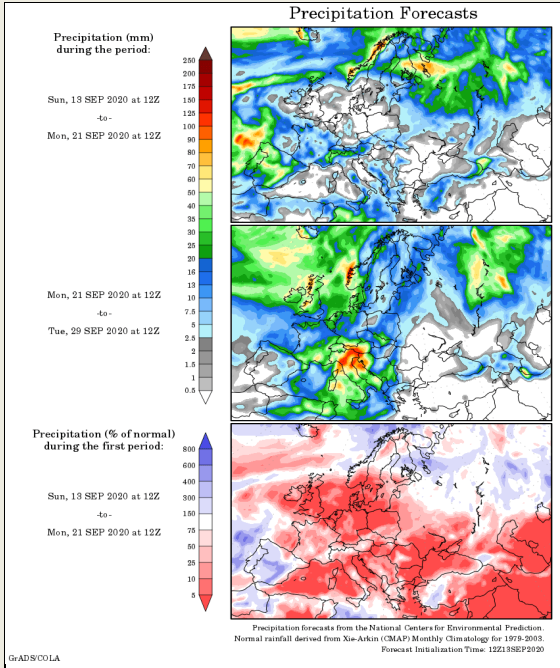
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

EUROPE: Dry and warm weather will occur over a large portion of Europe through Tuesday. France, parts of Germany into the southeastern Balkan Nations will be too dry and a return of greater rainfall is needed to bolster soil moisture. Rain showers and thunderstorms will increase over portions of France, the U.K. into Germany and Italy Wednesday into the second week of the outlook, but confidence in the moisture is low and rainfall that does occur will be erratic and pockets of drying will prevail.

AUSTRALIA: Very little to no rain will occur over western portions of Western Australia, New South Wales or Queensland production areas this week. Rain is needed in Queensland immediately to support reproduction.

Ⓜ Erratic showers may return to coastal areas of New South Wales and Queensland during the middle of next week, but will be light and erratic.

Ⓜ Otherwise, precipitation will be confined to surrounding areas of Victoria this weekend into early next week where totals will vary up to 0.50 inch.



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
