



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
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
South Africa - Weather

Eastern and central South Africa's summer crop areas will only have a few opportunities for light and erratic rain during the coming week. Rainfall will generally be too light to counter evaporation or impact long-term soil conditions. Recent rainfall has helped support favorable establishment and growth in most locations, though additional rain is needed to completely fix the moisture deficits. The lack of rain and periods of warm weather will promote aggressive drying and crop development may slow as a result. Timely rain is still expected later this month into December due to ta Nina and should slowly improve development prospects in most locations. Winter wheat harvesting in Free State and North West will advance with few disruptions. Western Cape and Northern Cape will only have a few opportunities for rain during the coming week. Portions of Western Cape may receive enough rain to briefly slow winter wheat harvesting, though producers will have plenty of opportunities to get into the fields between rain events. Northern Cape's main winter wheat areas will not receive enough rain to significantly impact the harvest.









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
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
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
United States of America - Weather


U.S. MIDWEST: The Midwest will see only two rounds of organized precipitation during the next two weeks and harvesting should soon be completed in most areas.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: Tropical Storm Eta will move across the northern Florida Peninsula and into the Atlantic Ocean today before moving away from the southeastern states causing little significant impact on crops along its path, but another round of heavy rain and flooding will occur in the Carolinas and southern Virginia where further impacts to cotton are likely. Dry weather will be most common in the Delta and the Southeast Friday through Nov. 26 and harvesting should advance well around a couple rounds of mostly light rain.









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



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
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
South America - Weather

BRAZIL: Much of Brazil and Paraguay will benefit from additional rain through Wednesday and nearly all areas will receive enough rain to improve soil moisture and conditions for crop development with some exceptions in Bahia and also from west-central into central and southern Rio Grande do Sul where rain will be too light and infrequent to prevent significant drying. Drier weather will return Nov. 19-26 and that will be beneficial for planting, but with little rain for a large part of Brazil and Paraguay many areas will need an increase in rain soon to keep conditions for crops from deteriorating with some quick increases in crop stress in the drier areas in Rio Grande do Sul. 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
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
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: Restricted precipitation will allow for swift crop maturation and harvesting in most of Europe through Tuesday. Some Mediterranean locations and southeastern Balkan Nations will continue to strougele with dryness concerns, but most other locations have adequate soil moisture to continue to support where crop establishment.


AUSTRALIA: Little has change from early this week for the ten days outlook in Australia infrequent and light rain will impact Australia's major production areas. The drier conditions will promote favorable conditions

AUSTRALIA: Little has change from early this week for the ten days outlook in Australia. Infrequent and light rain will impact Australia's major production areas. The drier conditions will promote favorable conditions for winter grain and wheat maturation and harvest. In the meantime, a soaking of rain would be welcome in east-central Australia and most of Western Australia to support summer crop development, but no such event is expected and soil moisture deficits will prevail.









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
