



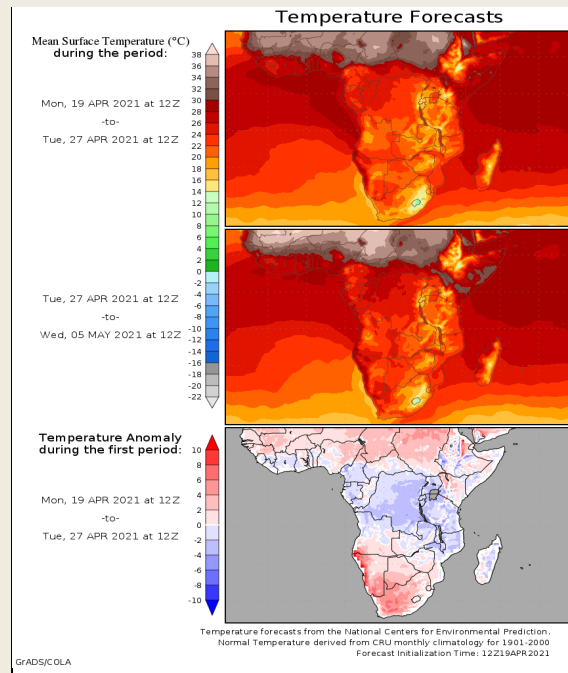
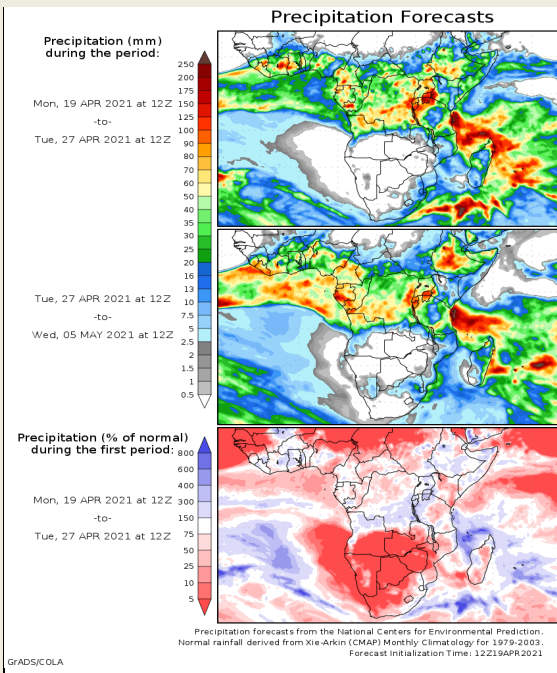
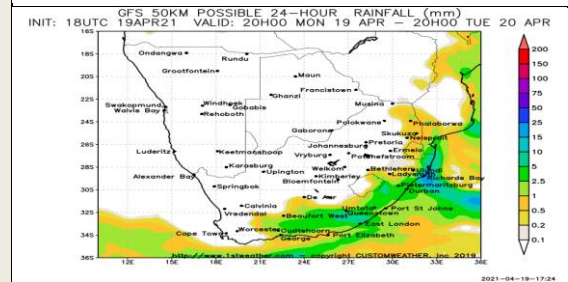
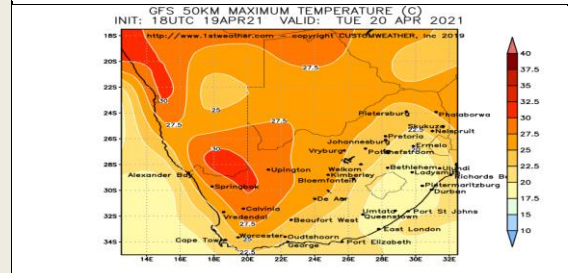
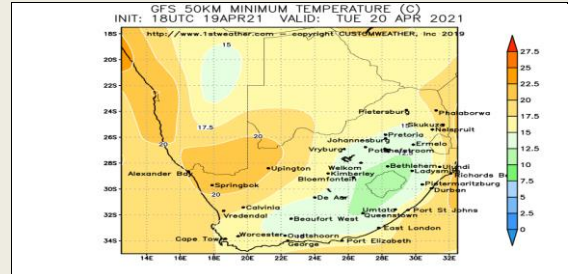
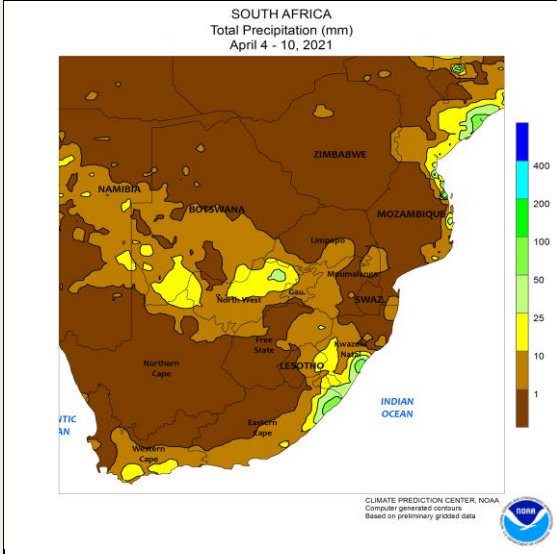
Weather Report

20 April 2021

South Africa - Weather

Portions of far southern and eastern South Africa will have opportunities for rain this week. However, rainfall will be too light to significantly slow or delay coarse grain and oilseed harvesting. Central South Africa will otherwise be mostly dry and the harvest will continue with few disruptions. Eastern South Africa into Eastern Cape and Western Cape will see a mix of rain and sunshine this week

- o The first round of rain will occur today and Tuesday with more rain occurring later this week and weekend
- o Moisture totals by next Monday morning will range from 0.25-1.00" with locally greater amounts near and along the southern coast
- The remaining portions of South Africa will be mostly dry this week
- o Any rain that does occur will be lost to evaporation
- South Africa will see a mix of light rain and sunshine April 27 – May 3

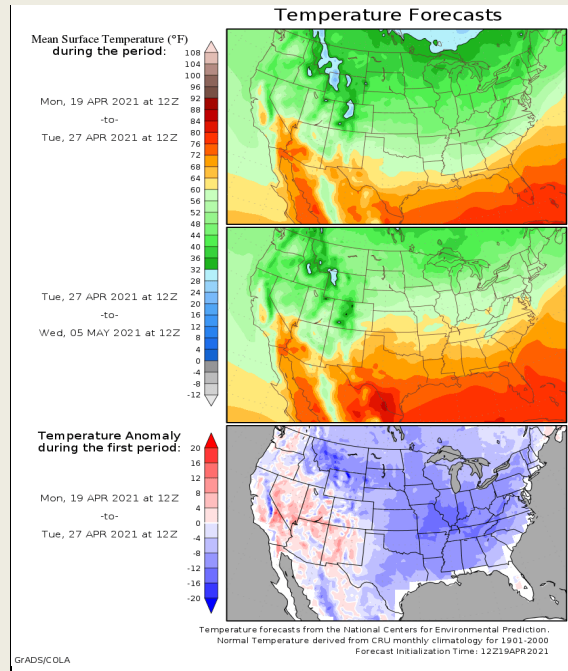
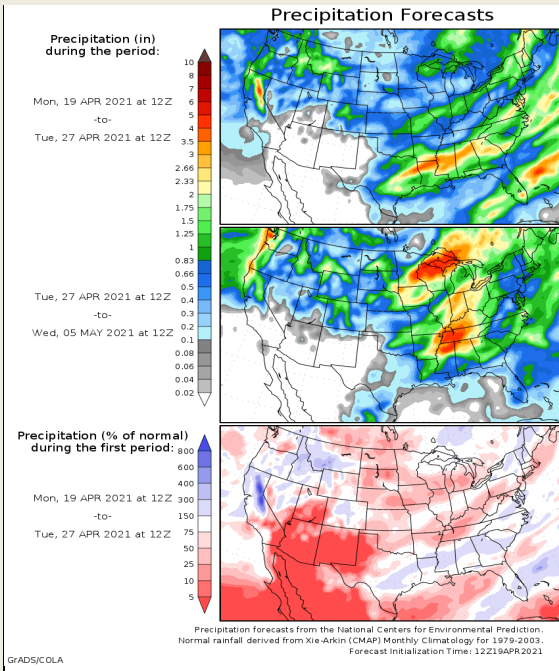
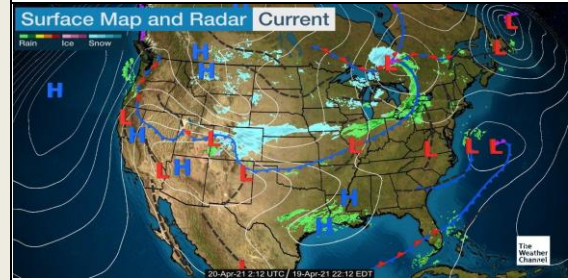
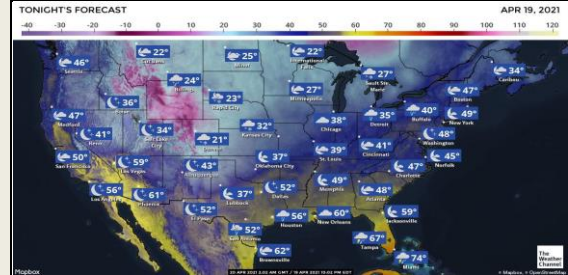
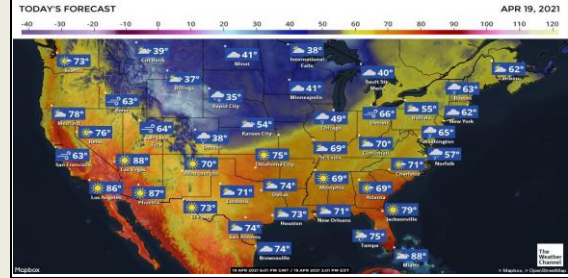
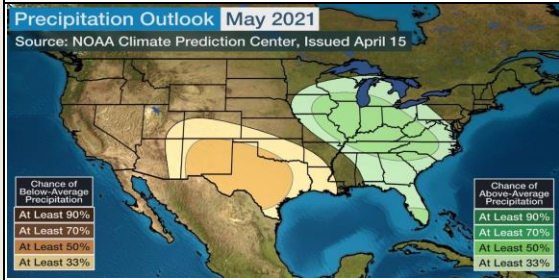


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United States of America - Weather

U.S. MIDWEST: Fieldwork should advance well overall during the next two weeks around the regular rounds of precipitation expected as most precipitation events will be light and not widespread with an exception Apr. 27-29 when a strong storm system should cross the region. The eastern Dakotas and eastern Nebraska to Wisconsin, northern Illinois, and Michigan will see little precipitation of significance through the next week and western parts of this region are in need of rain to increase soil moisture. The April 27-29 precipitation event will be timely and should induce notable increases in soil moisture in advance of the main planting season.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: Frost and a few light freezes will return to the northern Delta and some northern areas in the Southeast Wednesday through Friday mornings and vegetative development of some crops should be burned back by the cold with serious damage to crops not anticipated. A minor amount of early emerged corn damage is possible. The Delta and the Southeast will see more sunshine than rain during the next two weeks and good planting progress should be made around two nearly widespread rain events occurring Thursday night into Saturday and Apr. 27-29.



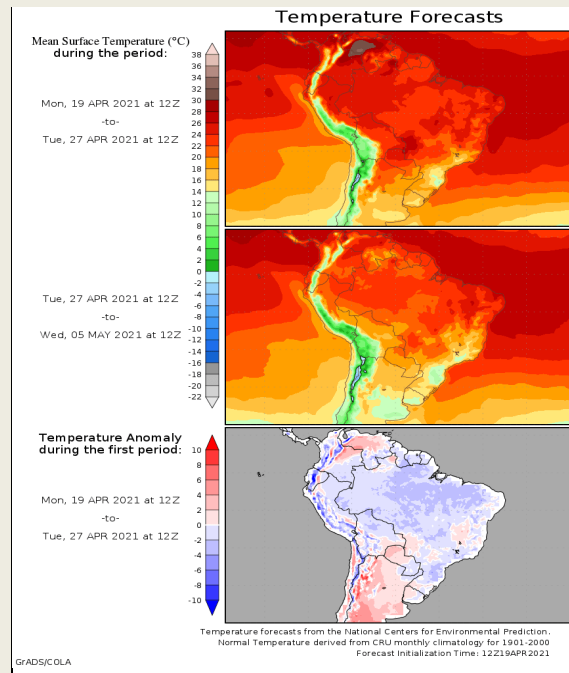
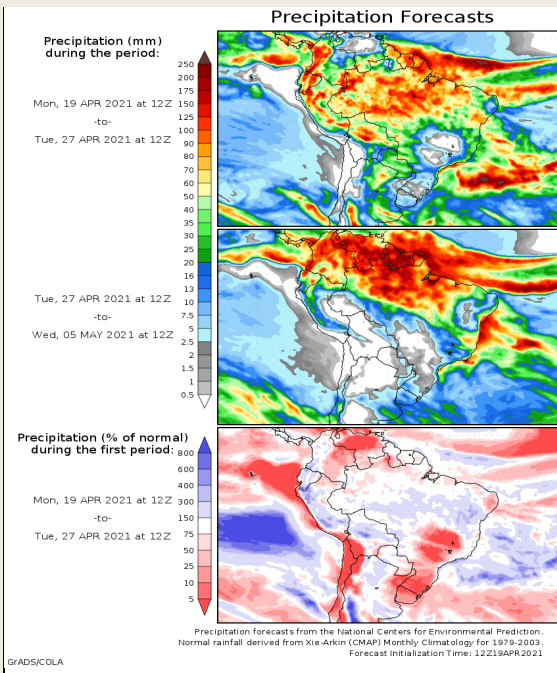
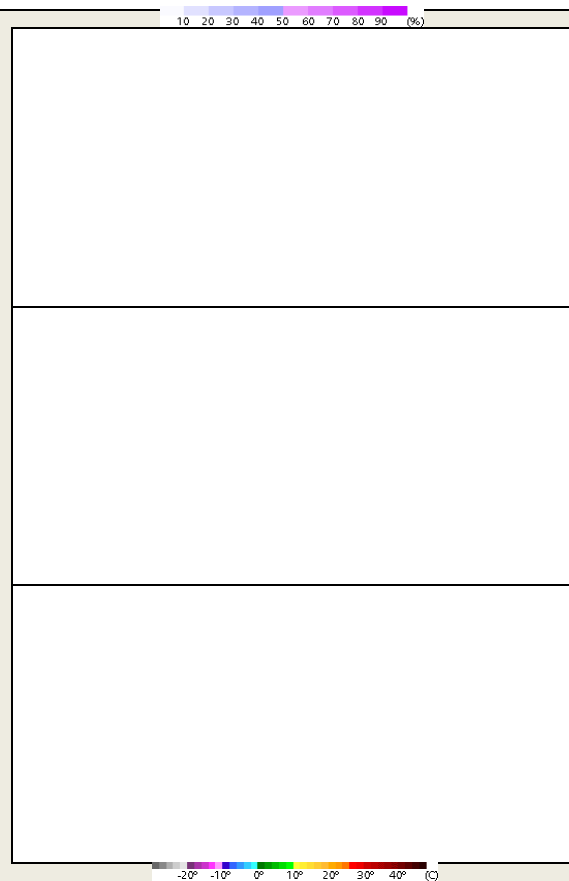
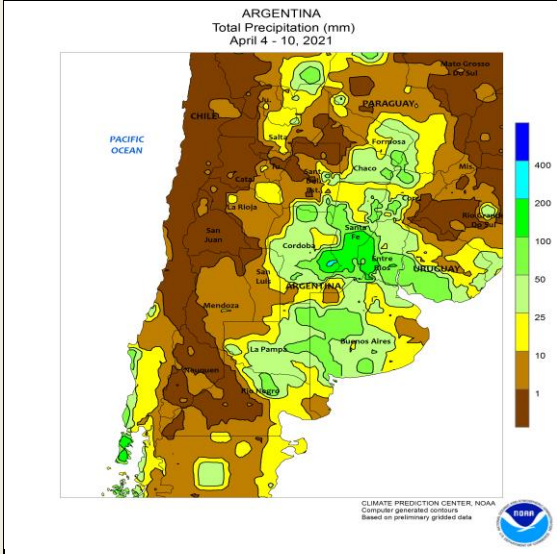
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South America - Weather

BRAZIL: Northeastern Brazil will see a significant increase in rain through Friday and improvements in soil moisture will occur in Bahia and northern Minas Gerais while lighter rain extends to the west into northern and central Mato Grosso with little rain elsewhere.

• A temporary increase in rain will occur in Paraguay and Mato Grosso do Sul Saturday into next Monday and second season corn will benefit from the moisture while most other areas see little to no rain of significance. Second season corn in portions of Parana and Sao Paulo may see rising levels of crop stress in late April and early May as the soil moisture declines while corn in Mato Grosso and Goias should have enough soil moisture to develop favorably for a while longer, but will need greater rain soon.

ARGENTINA: Nearly widespread and significant rain will fall Tuesday through Friday before drier weather Saturday through May 3 allows harvesting to resume and become aggressive.
o There are a few immature crops that will benefit from this week's rain.



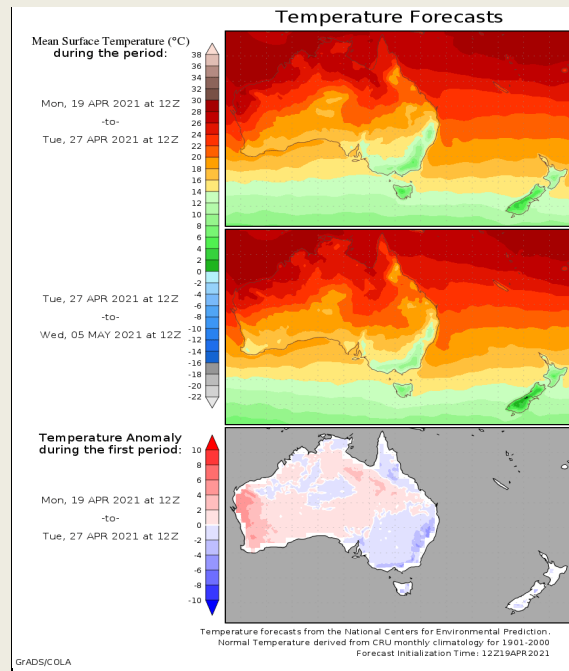
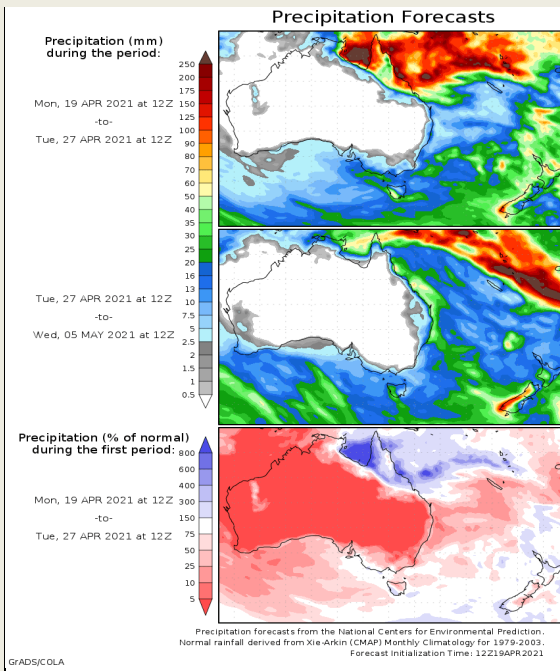
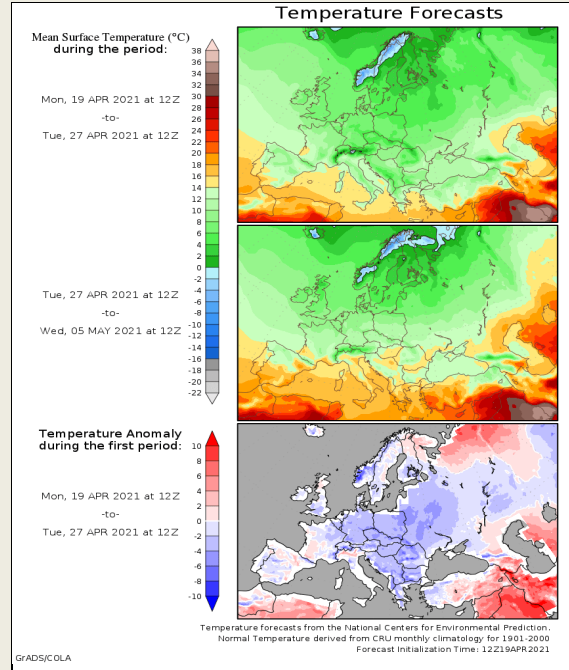
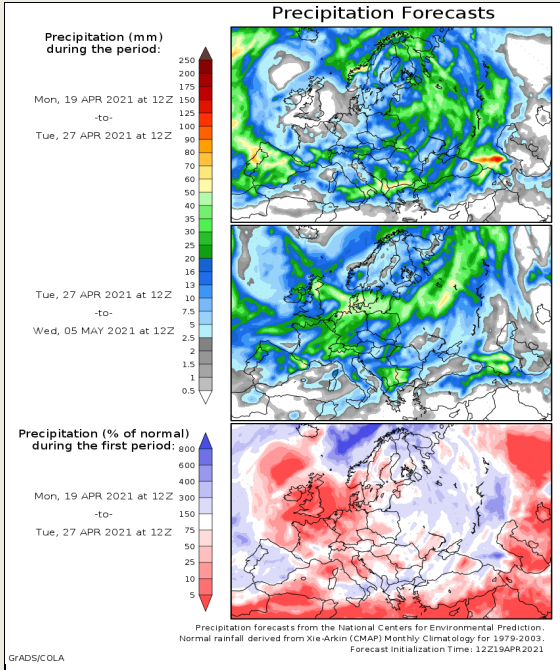
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Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

EUROPE: Rounds of rain and snow will occur throughout Europe during the coming ten days to two weeks providing a favorable soil moisture environment for crops once warmer temperatures return later in April and into May for aggressive crop development. A cooler bias will occur over Europe during much of the coming week to ten days and frost and freezes will linger throughout the continent.

o Highest temperatures were in the 50s and 60s most often, although highest temperatures were confined to the 40s and 50s in northern areas.

AUSTRALIA: Scattered showers and thunderstorms will increase over the central coast of Queensland into surrounding areas of northern grain production areas Thursday into Friday and linger in to the weekend. Rain today into Wednesday will be confined to the Cape York Peninsula and surrounding areas most often and coverage and intensity will slowly increase toward the middle of the week. Next week restricted precipitation will occur over most of Australia. Eventually an increase in rain will be needed to bolster soil moisture throughout the continents major winter crop areas, especially areas outside of southern and eastern Victoria into eastern New South Wales where locations have been dry for quite some time.



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
