
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
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
South Africa - Weather


Central South Africa will see a good mix of rain and sunshine through the middle of next week. Rainfall will be enough to gradually bolster soil moisture and promote a good environment for summer grain, oilseed, and cotton planting. Additional rain will still be needed to completely fix the moisture deficits. Winter wheat harvesting may be sluggish at times and minor quality reductions will be possible in the wettest locations.

Eastern South Africa will only have a few opportunities for light rain during the coming week. The rain that does occur will generally be too light to counter evaporation or impact long-term soil conditions. Planting will advance swiftly in most locations, though establishment and growth will be sluggish due to the lack of topsoil moisture in Limpopo and portions of Mpumalanga and Natal. Western South Africa will have a few opportunities for erratic rainfall during the coming week as well. The rain may briefly slow or delay winter wheat harvesting, though no significant crop impacts are expected.









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
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
United States of America - Weather


U.S. MIDWEST: The Midwest will see significant rain today through Friday stalling fieldwork in much of the region before a drier weather pattern this weekend through Nov. 10 allows harvesting to

o Much of the eastern Midwest will be dry today and harvesting should advance in areas that did not see heavy rain during the weekend.
o The lower Midwest will see another round of precipitation Monday into Tuesday with the

precipitation mostly light while the northern Midwest is mostly dry.
U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: The Delta and the Southeast will see more sunshine than rain and good harvest progress during the next two weeks with two rounds of rain that should not cause more than temporary interruptions to fieldwork.







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
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
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
South America - Weather


BRAZIL: Rio Grande do Sul and Paraguay to Parana will dry down during the next two weeks and fieldwork should advance well while two rounds of rain during the period and moist soils in place today should keep the region from becoming excessively dry. Regular rounds of showers and thunderstorms will occur through the next two weeks across northern and central Brazil inducing some increases in soil moisture while maintaining or improving conditions for planting and establishment of crops.

ARGENTINA: Argentina will see more sunshine than rain and good planting progress through the next two weeks. A notable exception will occur Sunday into Tuesday when nearly widespread rain ensures favorable soil conditions for planting and establishment of crops in most areas through the period. Enough rain should fall on the drier areas in the west to induce improvements in soil moisture, but a full restoration of soil moisture is not expected and rain will be needed again soon.









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
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
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
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: A low-pressure system will develop over the Mediterranean Sea this weekend and the storm system will become stronger early next week and heavy rain will develop over southern Italy and is expected to eventually meander over Greece late next week. Flash flooding will occur with the torrential rainfall.

AUSTRALÍA: Beneficial rain will occur in portions of interior sorghum and cotton production areas Thursday into Monday. With that said, greater rain will be needed in most interior locations of Queensland to ease dryness and provide a favorable environment for dryland crops. In the meantime, a favorable mix of rain and sunshine will continue to provide a mostly favorable environment for winter wheat, barley and canola production areas.









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
