
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
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
South Africa - Weather


Eastern South Africa will see a mix of erratic rain and sunshine this week. The rain will help bolster soil moisture in many locations, but may be too light to completely fix the moisture deficits. Grain, oilseed, and cotton planting will still advance swiftly around the periods of rain. Establishment and growth conditions will be mostly good due to the rain.

Central and western South Africa will generally be drier biased this week. Southwestern Western Cape will still see periods of rain that may slow winter wheat harvesting at times. The harvest in Free State and Northern Cape will otherwise advance with few disruptions. Planting of summer crops in central South Africa will also occur with few disruptions. Many areas in Free State and North West will be too dry to support aggressive establishment and growth and will need to see timely rain later this month. • Eastern South Africa will see alternating periods of rain and sunshine this week o Other than a few isolated showers in Natal, the region will be mostly dry through Wednesday B's Cattered showers will evolve on a frequent basis Thursday into this weekend B'Moisture totals by next Monday morning will range from 0.75-3.00" and locally greater amounts in Natal and Mpumalanga B'Llimpopo and eastern fringes of Free State and North West will receive 0.25-1.00" of rain and locally greater amounts









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United States of America - Weather


U.S. MIDWEST: The Midwest will see a restricted precipitation through much of the next two weeks and harvesting should increase and soon become aggressive.


 Only one round of significant precipitation is expected with that event advertised for Nov. 9-11 and confidence for its details low.


U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: The Delta and the Southeast will see more sunshine than rain and good harvest progress during the next two weeks with rain events Tuesday night through Thursday and Nov. 11-12 causing minor interruptions to field-work

o The rain expected should cause some temporary cotton discoloration while winter crops benefit from increases in soil moisture expected.







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
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
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
South America - Weather


BRAZIL: Northern Brazil will see frequent rain through the next two weeks slowing fieldwork while some flooding is likely as well. Northern Mato Grosso to northern Minas Gerais will be wettest. Rio Grande do Sul to Sao Paulo will dry down during the next two weeks and fieldwork should advance well while at least some rain and moist soils in place today should keep the region from becoming excessively dry. Parana and Sao Paulo will be driest and will need rain soon. Paraguay into Mato Grosso do Sul will see a good mix of rain and sunshine during the next two weeks with enough rain to support most crops while breaks between rounds of rain allow fieldwork to advance. ARGENTINA: Today's forecast is wetter than what was advertised late last week and the additional rain expected during the next two weeks across the country should induce further improvements in soil moisture and conditions for crop development in the driest areas of the west while causing some interruptions to fieldwork.

o Eastern Argentina will see lighter rain than the west, but enough rain should fall to favorably support planting and establishment of crops with fieldwork likely to advance well around the rain.









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
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
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
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: A low-pressure system will develop over the Mediterranean Sea this weekend and the storm system will become stronger early next week and heavy rain will develop over southern Italy and is expected to eventually meander over Greece late next week. Flash flooding will occur with the torrential rainfall.

AUSTRALIA: A favorable mix of rain and sunshine will continue over most of eastern Australia during the coming week. The weather conditions will support winter wheat, barley and canola development and production potentials. Summer crop planting will advance around the rainfall with the greatest progress in dryland areas that have received recent rainfall. There is no excessive moisture expected during the coming week to ten days which will benefit maturing winter crops, but greater rainfall is still needed to bolster soil moisture for summer crops, although plenty of time remains for the increased moisture.









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
