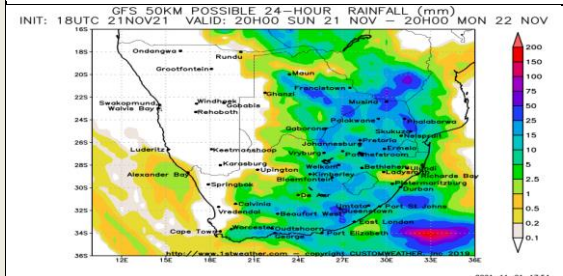
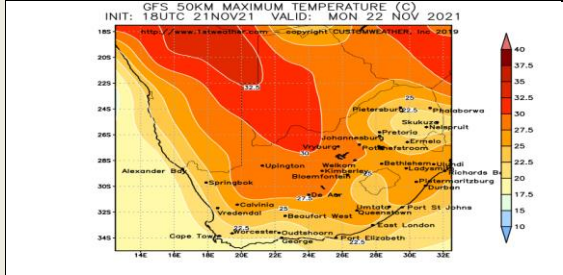
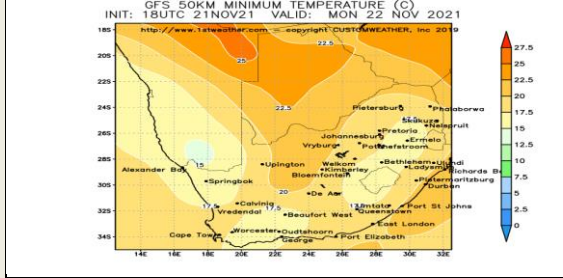
South Africa - Weather

Frequent waves of erratic rain are still slated for eastern and central South Africa through the end of next week. The wet weather pattern will help bolster soil moisture in most locations. Additional rain will still be needed to completely fix the moisture deficits in most locations, though establishment and growth conditions will gradually improve. Planting may be sluggish at times in areas that receive the most rain. Harvesting of winter wheat may also advance slowly in Free State. Western Cape and portions of Northern Cape will also have a few opportunities for rain through the end of next week. Winter wheat harvesting may be slowed at times, though producers will still have an opportunity to get into the fields between rain events.

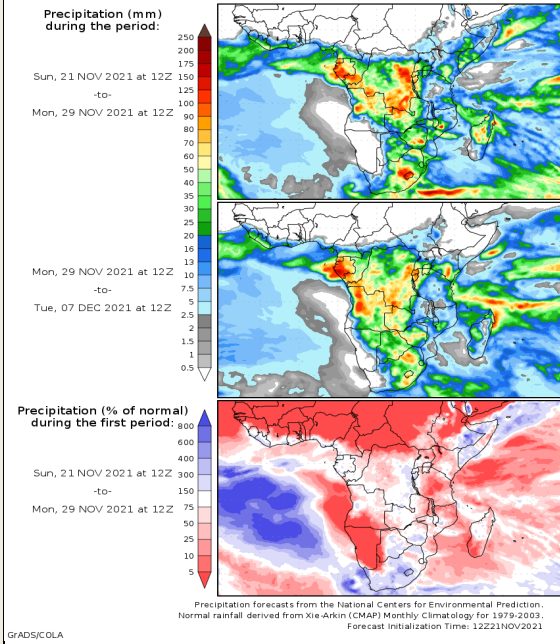
SOUTH AFRICA

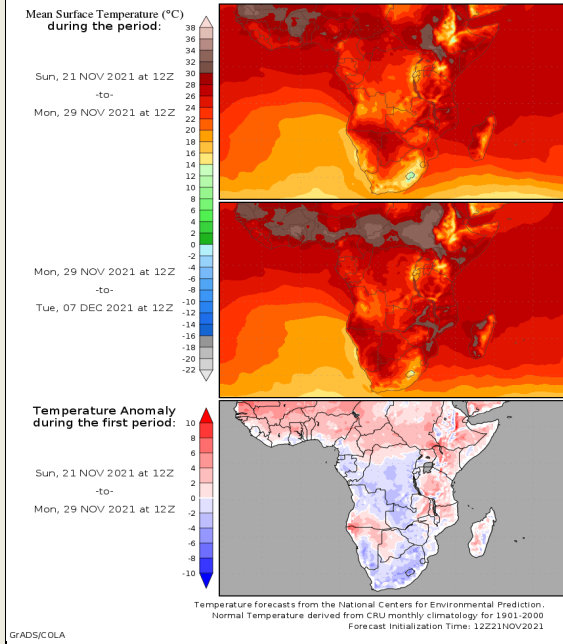
Precipitation Forecasts

Forecast Initialization Time: 12Z21NOV2021

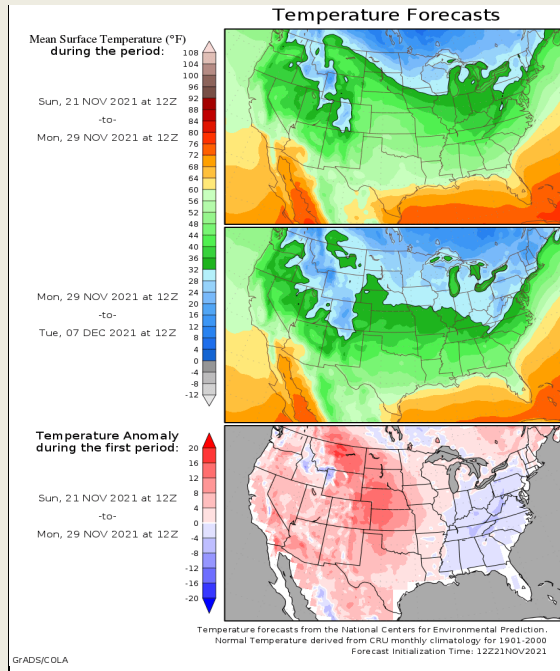
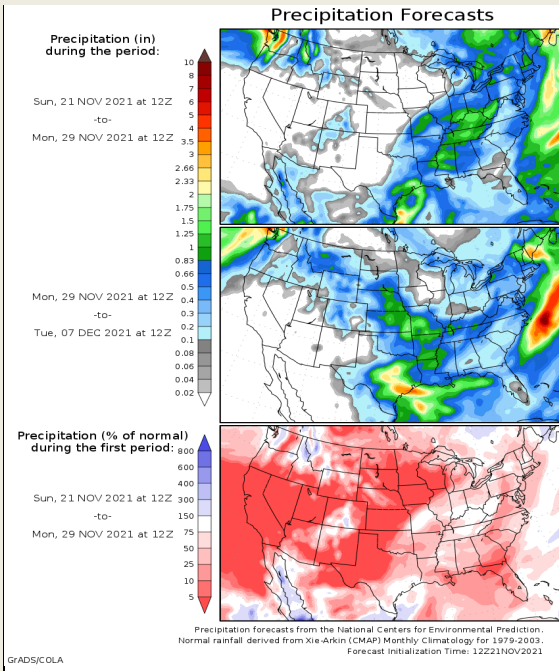
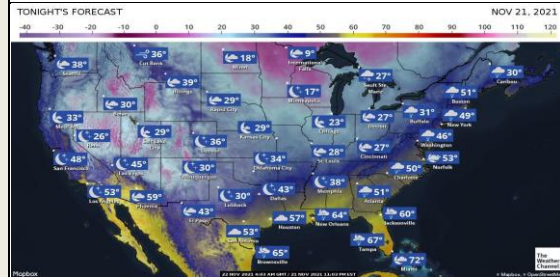
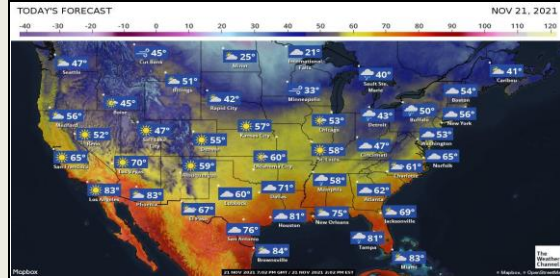
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United States of America - Weather

U.S. MIDWEST: Late-season harvesting and other fieldwork should advance well in the northwest half of the Midwest during the next two weeks as most days will be dry and when precipitation does fall it should not be heavy.
 o The wettest period will be Thursday into Sunday, Nov. 28 when the southeast half of the Corn Belt receives precipitation.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: The southeastern states will have good opportunities for harvesting during the next two weeks while the Delta sees precipitation events Sunday into Monday and Nov. 26-27 causing temporary interruptions to fieldwork.
 o Significant precipitation is expected Nov. 26-27, but the ground should be dry enough that prolonged delays to harvesting do not result, despite some heavy rain in parts of the region.
 o Fieldwork in the Delta will be most restricted while the precipitation that falls in the southeastern states will be lightest and most infrequent

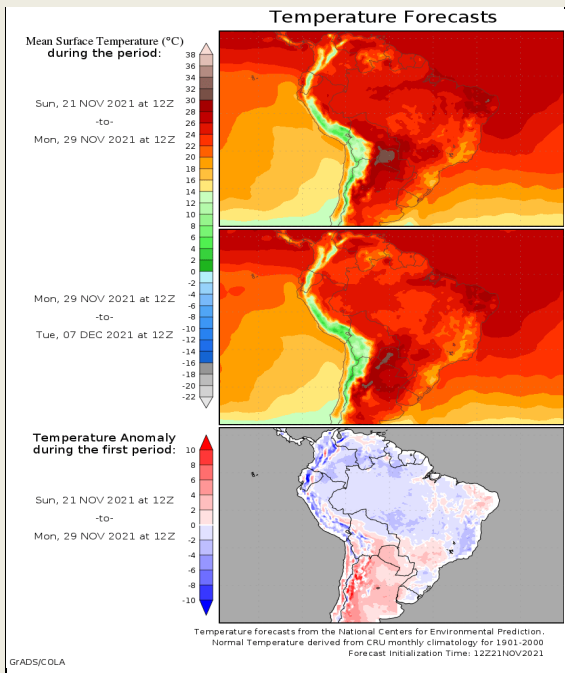
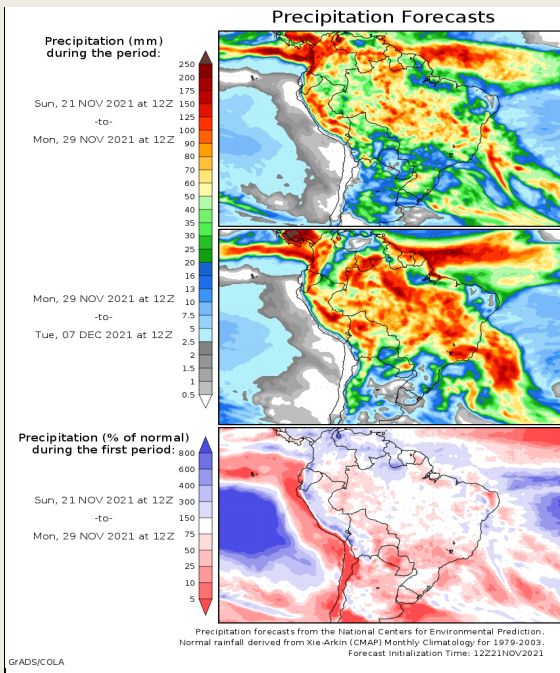
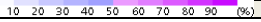
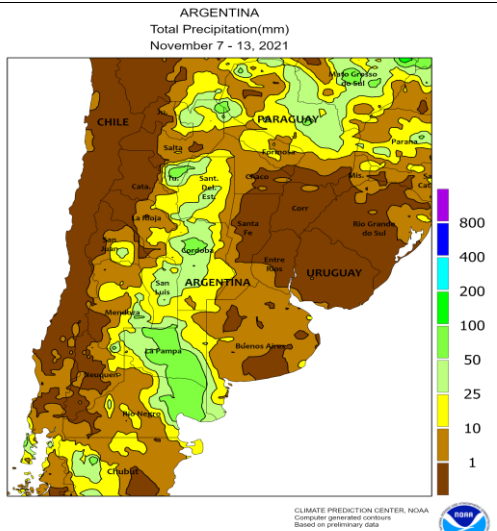


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South America - Weather

BRAZIL: Drier weather will return to southern Brazil and Paraguay through Monday before rain events Tuesday into next Friday and Nov. 29-Dec. 1 ensure favorable soil moisture in much of the region through early December. Much of the region is not expected to see heavy rain and good planting progress should occur around the rain events. Rain next week will be lightest in Rio Grande do Sul and the Nov. 29-Dec. 1 rain event will be important in preventing the topsoil from drying out. Most of the remainder of Brazil and Paraguay will see regular rounds of rain through the next two weeks and increases in soil moisture are likely in many areas with some exceptions in Bahia. Southern Mato Grosso to central Minas Gerais will be wettest while eastern Bahia is driest and will need rain soon.

ARGENTINA: Argentina will see dry weather most often through the next two weeks and good planting progress will be made while the drying expected will raise the need for rain in early December. Much of the country has enough soil moisture to support crops through the next two weeks, but by late this month topsoil moisture should be short in southern and a few central areas and a boost in rain will be needed soon.



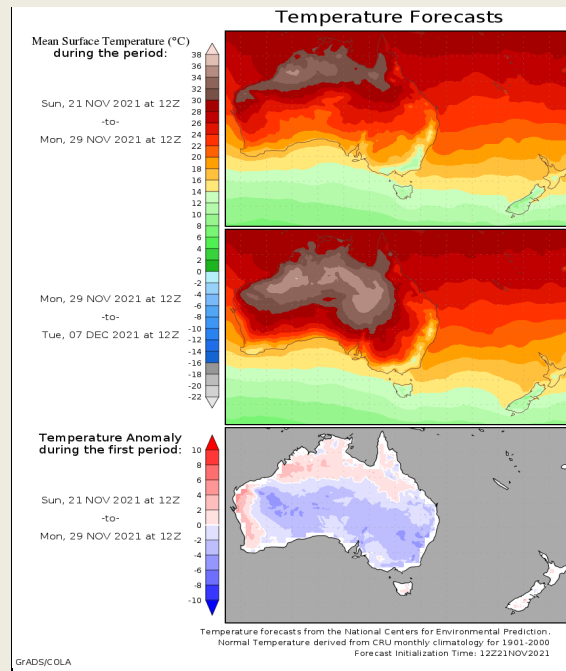
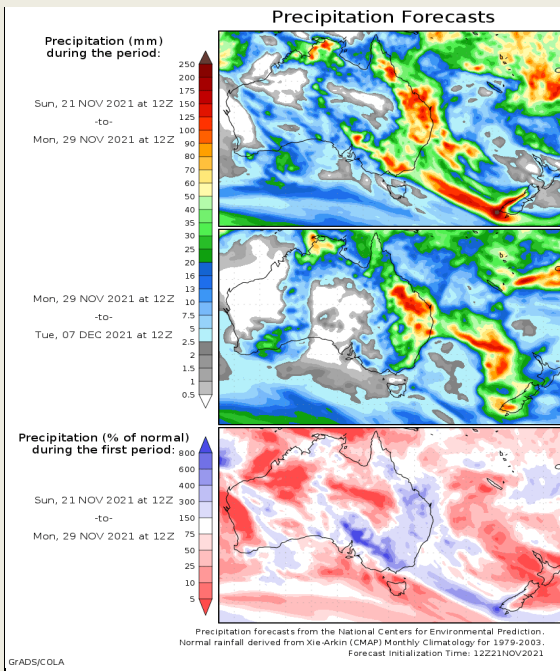
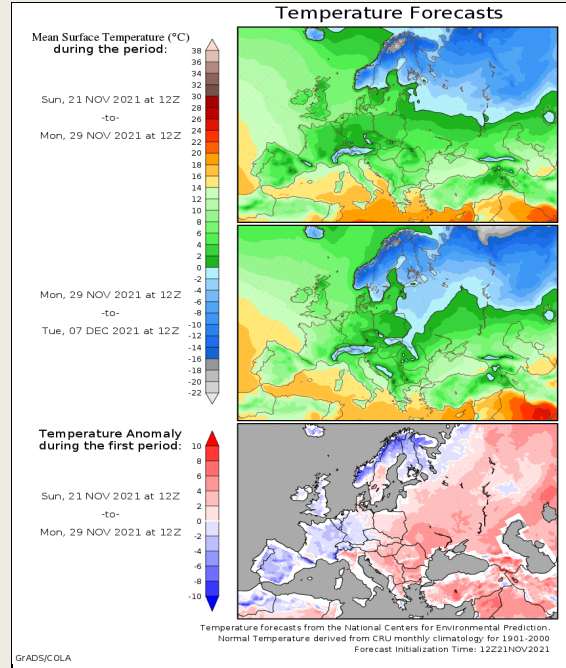
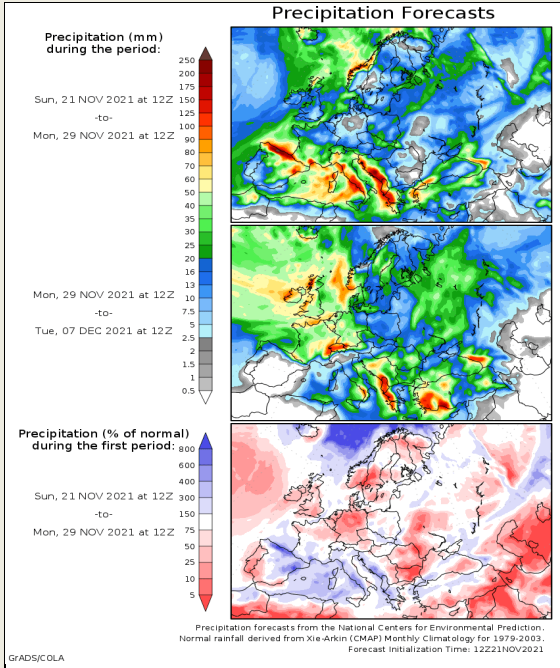
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Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

EUROPE: A low-pressure system will develop over the Mediterranean Sea this weekend and the storm system will become stronger early next week and heavy rain will develop over southern Italy and is expected to eventually meander over Greece late next week. Flash flooding will occur with the torrential rainfall.

AUSTRALIA: Additional rain will impact the western slopes through the Great Dividing Range and eastern coast today into Monday and follow up rain will occur Wednesday into Thursday. Additional delay to harvesting of winter wheat, barley and canola will cause some worry of unharvested crops in the western slopes where some quality decreases have already occurred.

Moisture totals will range from 0.75 to 2.50 inches and local totals in excess of 3.00 inches from the western slopes to the eastern coast of southeastern Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria this week.



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
