South Africa - Weather

Frequent rainfall will persist for the main production areas in South Africa through the end of next week. Rainfall will be enough to keep soil moisture at adequate to excessive levels in most locations Flash flooding is still a concern for Mpumalanga, Natal, and neighboring areas; however, crop and structural damage is expected to be minimal. The outlook will remain generally favorable for the crops with exceptions for the areas that were impacted by flooding in Free State and North West earlier in the growing season. • South Africa will see several waves of rain through the end of next

o A series of disturbances will generate scattered showers and isolated thunderstorms on a near daily basis for the main production areas





Rainfall elsewhere will range from 0.50-2.00" with local amounts of 3.00" or more in Free State, North West, and southern Limpopo





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
United States of America - Weather


U.S. MIDWEST: The Midwest will see a quiet weather pattern through most of the next two weeks with a few rounds of mostly light precipitation.


o Precipitation will be greatest near and south of the Ohio River this weekend and additional increases in river and stream flows will result leaving the region prone to a quick increase in floodin if a heavy precipitation event were to occur soon.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: A mostly tranquil weather pattern will be in place during the next two weeks in the Delta and the Southeast outside of some light precipitation today, widespread rain Saturday into Sunday, and some light precipitation Jan. 13-14.

o Some of the driest areas from southeastern Georgia and nearby Florida to central and eastern South Carolina will benefit the precipitation, but much of the rain will be light and greater rain is needed to fully restore soil moisture.







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South America - Weather


BRAZIL: Paraguay and southern Brazil will see little to no rain of significance through late next week and with warm to hot temperatures returning next week, the region will see steady increases in crop stress and declining yield potentials.


a Bio Grande do Sul will be driest and with soil moisture already short crop yields should decline.




ARGENTINA: Hot and dry weather will occur through the next week and crops will continue to suffer with some recently planted crops possibly withering and dying while the early corn crop that is pollinating should see rapid declines in yield potentials.

o Temperatures will be mild today before warming occurs this weekend with highs in the upper 90s to 104 common Tuesday through late next week and extreme highs near 109 in the northwest and near 106 in the southwest and ocutheast









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
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
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
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: Rounds of precipitation will continue to maintain moist conditions throughout the North Sea Region into France, Germany, Switzerland and northeastern Italy as well as southern Scandinavia this week. Moisture will reach into the northwestern Balkan Nations Early next week.

AUSTRALIA: Rain will increase over southeastern portions of the continent today into Friday limiting fieldwork and raising concern over unharvested winter grains. Scattered showers will linger over central and northern New South Wales into southern Queensland this weekend and return to southeastern South Australia, Victoria and into New South Wales Monday into next Friday. The additional moisture will continue to hinder crop maturation and harvest and some concern over winter crops will prevail in the wettest locations, but precipitation should be scattered enough that some progress will occur in breaks in the moisture.









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
