



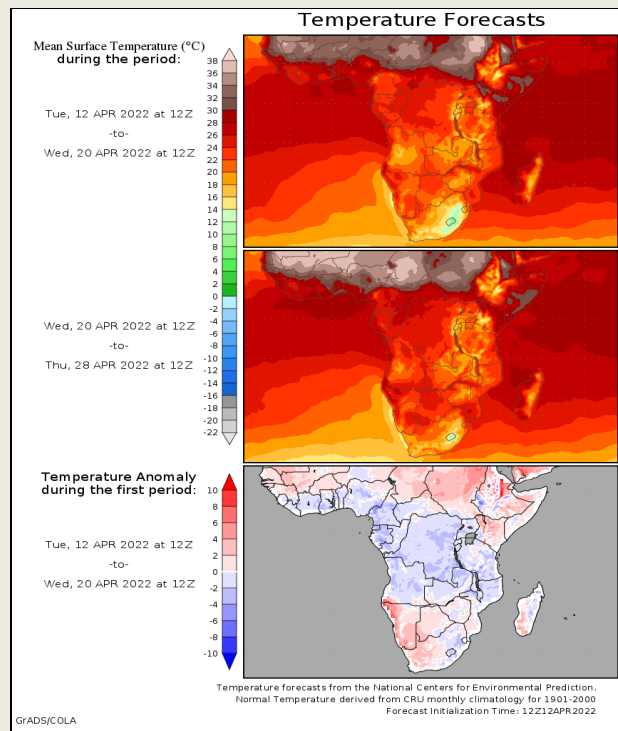
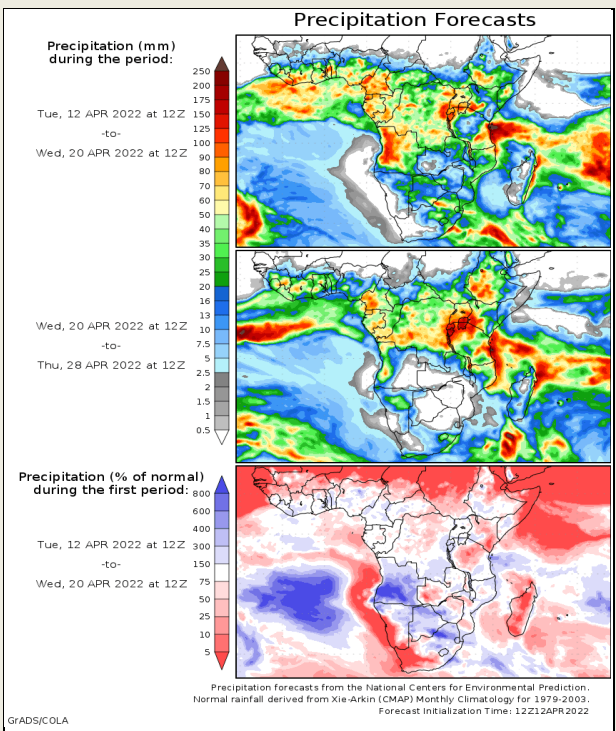
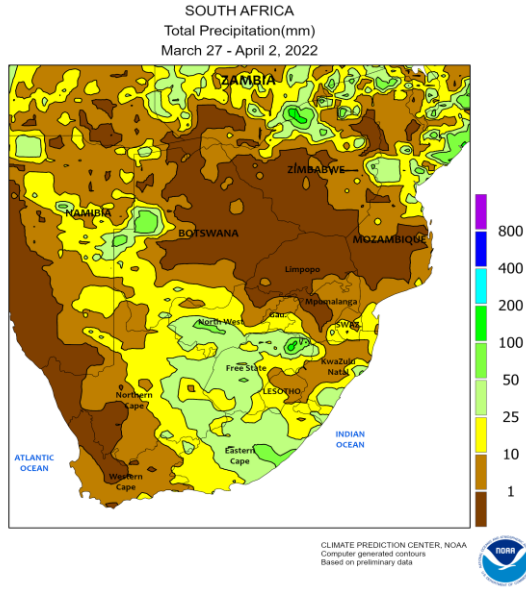
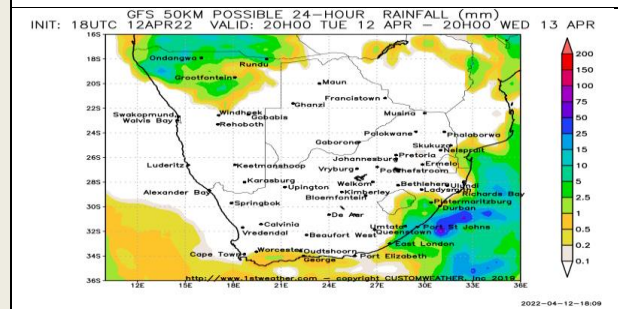
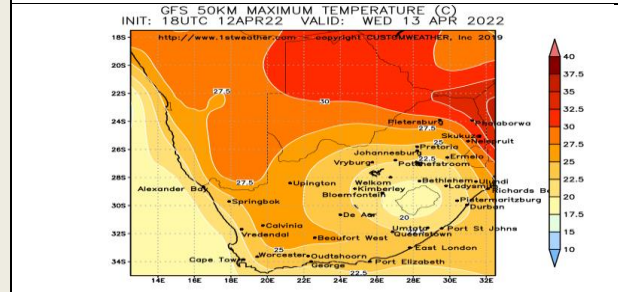
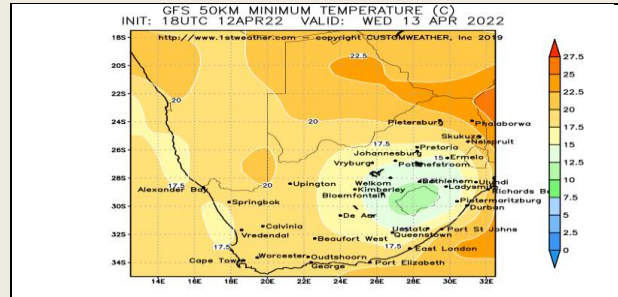
Weather Report

13 April 2022

South Africa - Weather

The main production areas in South Africa will see a mix of rain and sunshine during the coming week. The periods of rain will slow or delay harvesting, though rain totals will be too light to significantly impact crop quality. Harvesting will otherwise advance swiftly during the next few days before rain potentials increase late this week into early next week. Eastern and central South Africa will initially be drier biased through Thursday afternoon. A frontal boundary will bring rain to most locations late Thursday into Saturday with erratic rainfall persisting later this weekend and early next week.

- Moisture totals by next Tuesday morning will range from 0.75-3.00" with local amounts of 4.00" or more in Natal.
- Drier pockets are also expected in Limpopo.
- Western South Africa will generally be drier biased during the coming week.
- Eastern Northern Cape will still see periods of rain with totals ranging from 0.50-1.50" and locally greater amounts by next Tuesday morning.
- Other areas will not receive enough rain to counter evaporation.
- Alternating periods of light rain and sunshine are slated for eastern and central South Africa April 20 – 26
- Western South Africa will again be drier biased



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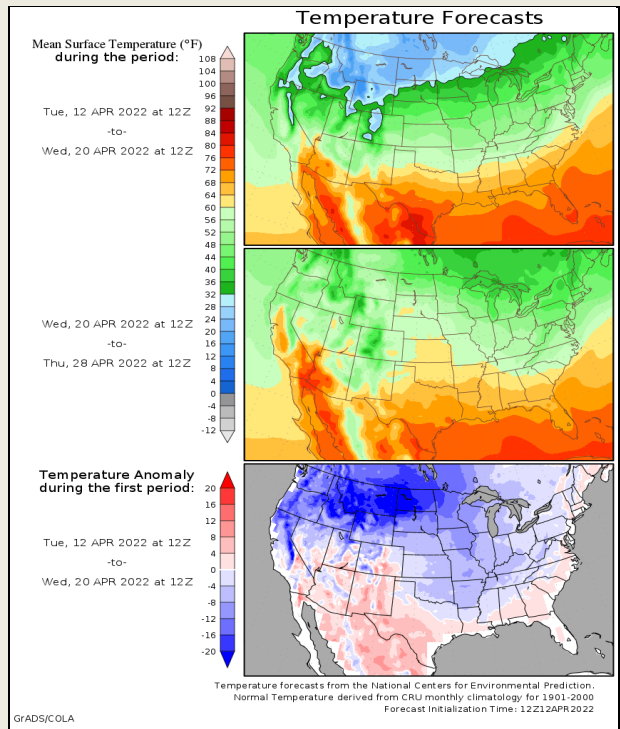
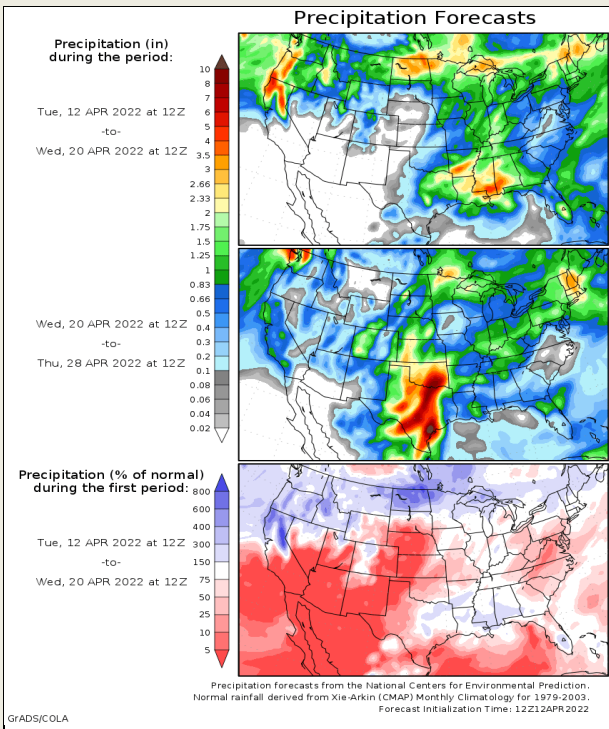
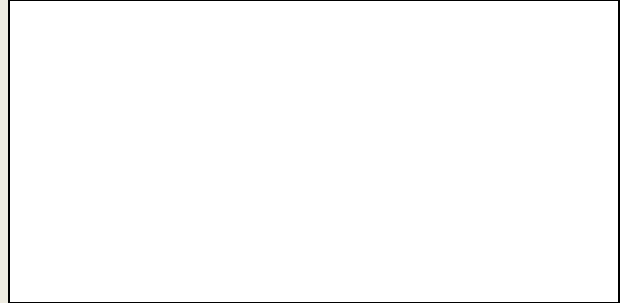
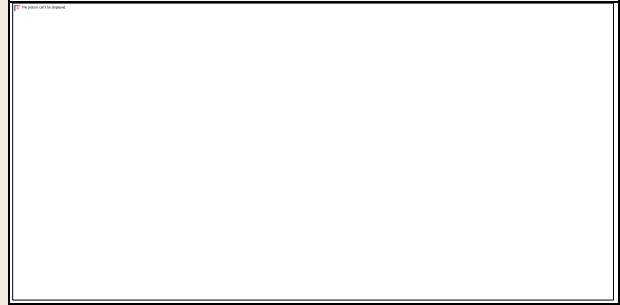
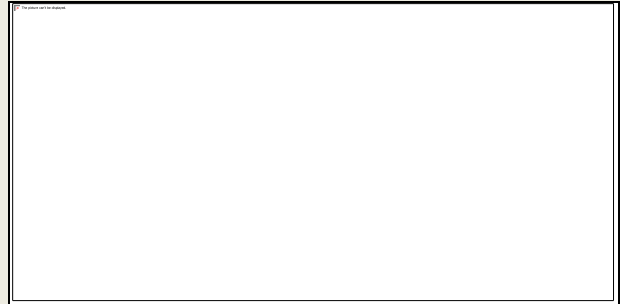
United States of America - Weather

U.S. MIDWEST: Three rounds of precipitation are expected through Apr. 21 and fieldwork will be sluggish as temperatures will often be cool enough that drying rates are too low to allow for much fieldwork to occur between precipitation events.

- o The moisture will be beneficial in the driest areas from eastern Nebraska into western Iowa, but the region will need additional precipitation to induce a full restoration of soil moisture.
- o Most of the precipitation should not be heavy enough to cause lasting delays to fieldwork if warmer and drier weather were to follow.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: RRain will increase today and the Delta and the Southeast will see frequent rain through Apr. 26 that will stall planting in much of the region with exceptions this week from Georgia to southern Virginia where dry weather will be most common through Wednesday.

- o Drier weather will be needed in the last days of the month to prevent planting delays from becoming extended.



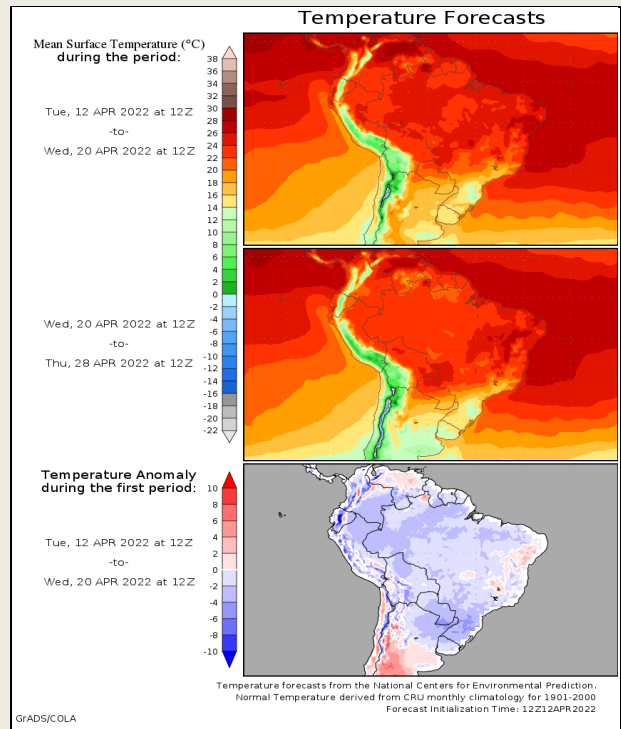
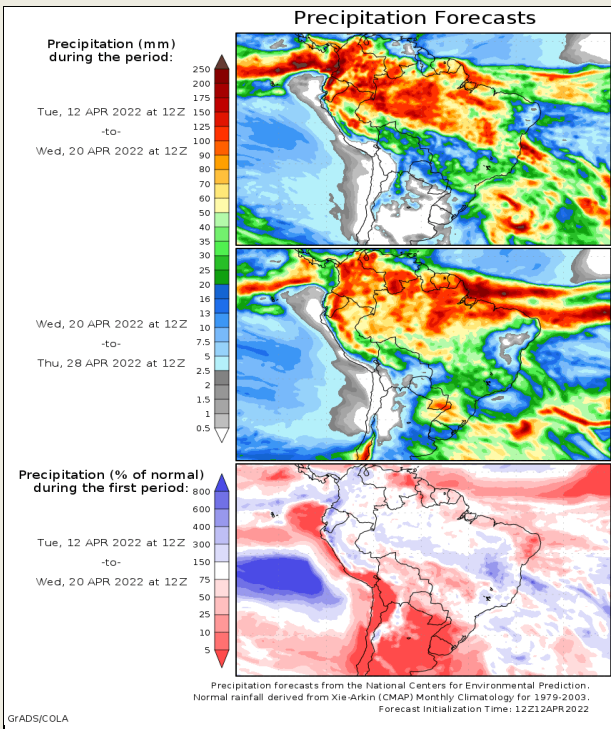
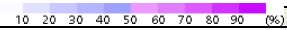
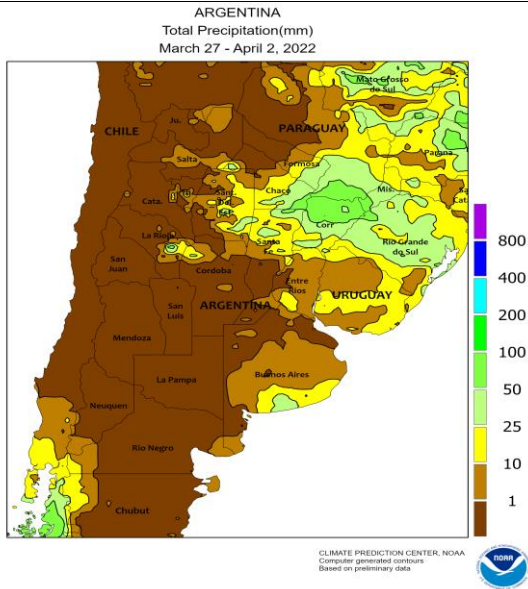
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South America - Weather

BRAZIL: Portions of Paraguay and southern Brazil will see additional rain into Wednesday that will result in delays to fieldwork with some flooding and crop quality declines possible. A welcome period of drier weather will occur Thursday through April 26 and conditions for crop maturation and harvesting should steadily improve around one round of rain occurring Apr. 21-22. Most of the remainder of Brazil will see more sunshine than rain through Wednesday and fieldwork should advance before a timely increase in showers Thursday through Sunday replenishes some of the topsoil moisture.

ARGENTINA: Dry weather will be most common through the next two weeks and fieldwork should advance well across the country with one round of organized rain advertised for Apr. 20-22. Soil moisture is favorable in much of the country and rain Apr. 20-22 will help to perpetuate favorable crop conditions in most areas.

Exceptions will occur from San Luis into portions of western Cordoba and western Santiago del Estero where soil moisture is short and some crops are likely stressed by the dryness and rain Apr. 20-22 would be beneficial.

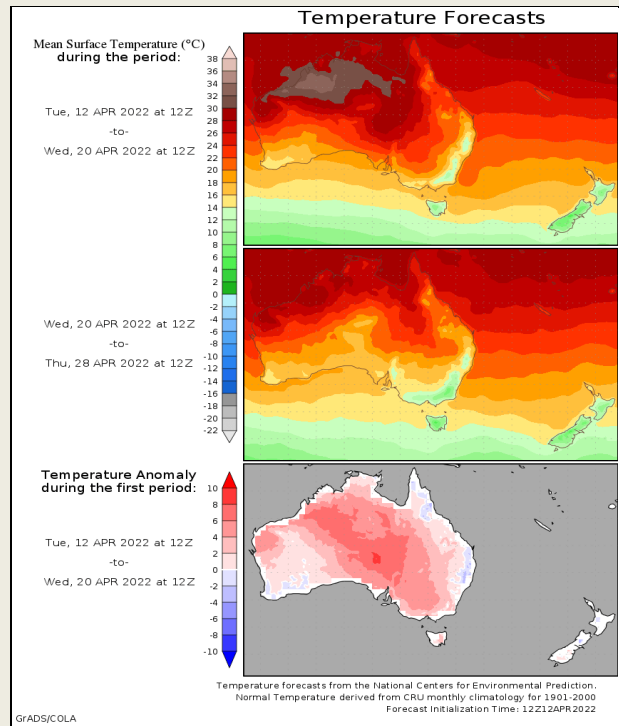
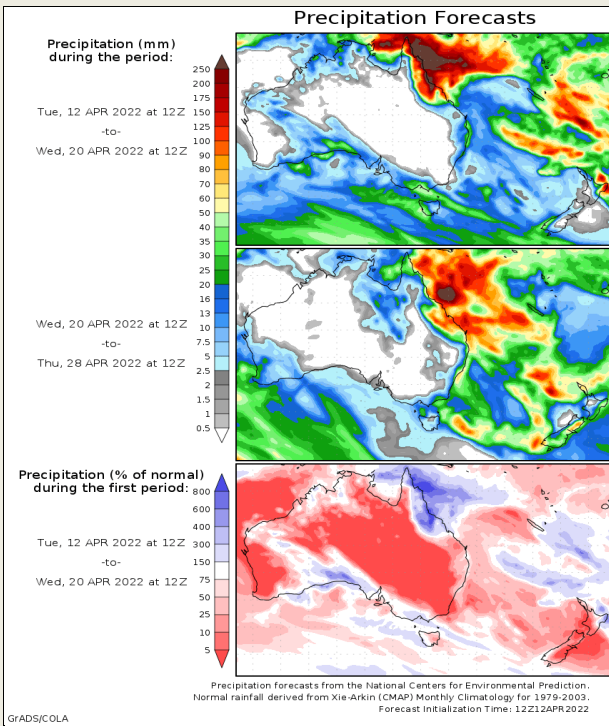
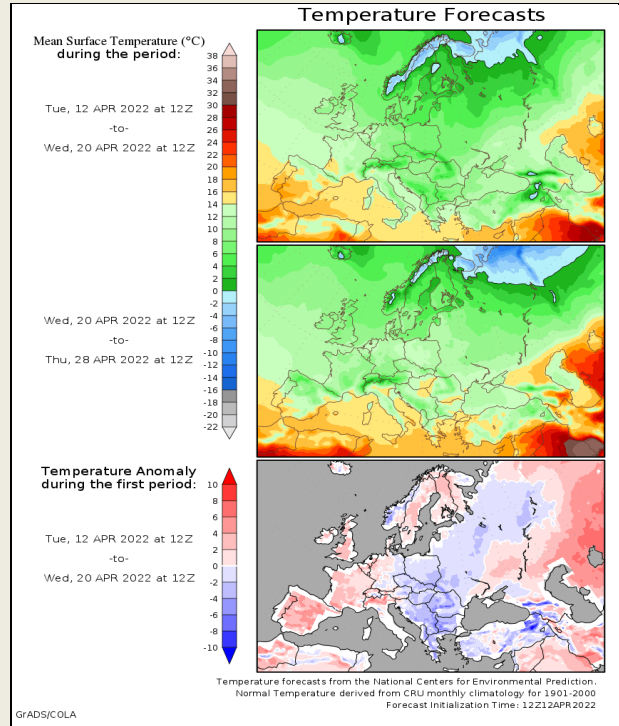
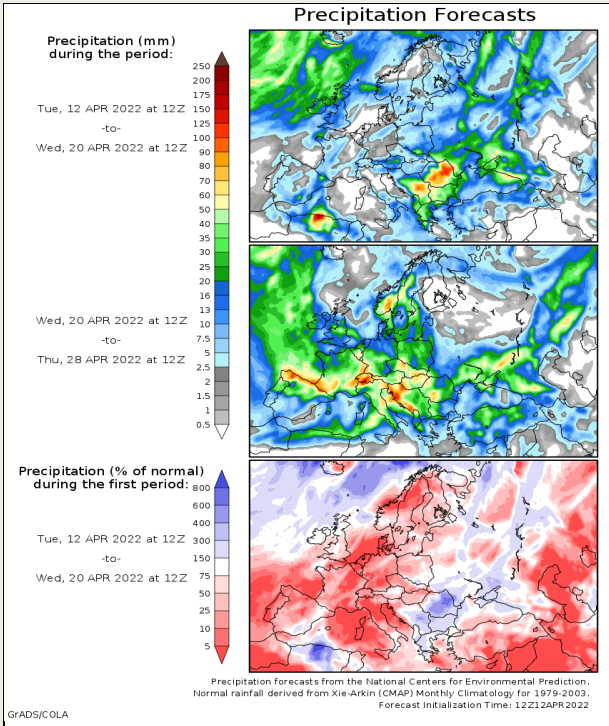


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Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

EUROPE: A mostly favorable weather pattern is expected through the first week of the outlook. There will be areas of rain with some pockets of heavy rain; however, the rain will be erratically distributed enough to not have a significant impact on fieldwork advancement. Above average temperatures this week will help warm the soil. There will be some pockets that receive no meaningful moisture and will be need of more rain in the second week.

AUSTRALIA: Drier-biased conditions in key crop areas of the east through the first seven days of the outlook will be beneficial for harvesting progress. There will be some rain; though, net drying is expected and fieldwork will advance favorably. Rain in winter crop production areas of Western Australia will be beneficial for raising topsoil moisture.



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
