
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
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
South Africa - Weather


Periods of erratic rain will evolve from Eastern Cape and Free State into eastern South Africa through the end of next week. Resulting rainfall will generally be lost to evaporation or too light to impact long-term soil conditions in the main production areas. The remaining production areas will be mostly dry through the end of next week. Winter wheat prospects will remain favorable despite the main wheat areas receiving little to no rain. Eastern Cape and Free State into eastern South Africa will see a mix of rain and sunshine through the end of next week o A frontal boundary will bring rain to these areas this weekend with some spotty rainfall also expected toward the middle and latter part of next week o Portions of Eastern Cape will receive 0.50-1.50" of rain by next Friday morning

- However, most locations will not receive enough rain to counter evaporation
- The remaining production areas in South Africa will be mostly dry through the end of next week
 o Any rain that does occur will be lost to evaporation
- South Africa will remain drier biased July 30 August 5
- o Eastern and southern South Africa will still have opportunities for light rain









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
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
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
United States of America - Weather


U.S. MIDWEST: A period of wetter weather through Thursday along with a lack of more than brief periods of heat in most areas through at least the next ten days should keep conditions for crops favorable in much of the Midwest with exceptions detailed below. Mild temperatures and daily showers July 29-Aug. 3 will keep crop conditions favorable across much of the Midwest through Aug. 5 while some of the drier areas mentioned above should see increasing stress again as rain will not likely be great enough to prevent the soil from drying out again.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: A combination of favorable soil moisture and scattered showers most days through the next two weeks from south-central Mississippi to Georgia and northern Florida to southern Virginia will leave much of the region with enough soil moisture to favorably support crop development through the period. The Delta through northern Alabama will see mostly stressful conditions for crops during the next two weeks as temperatures will be warm to hot, soil moisture is mostly short, and rain during the period will be too infrequent and light to induce more than temporary improvements in conditions for crops.









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South America - Weather


BRAZIL: Dry weather will be most common through the next two weeks with occasional rounds of rain in southern Paraguay and southern Brazil where temporary interruptions to fieldwork will result while regular rounds of light showers occur in eastern Bahia.


o Rain will be greatest in the south today, Thursday into next Friday, and Aug. 1-3.


ARGENTINA: Dry weather and favorable conditions for fieldwork will occur through much of the next two weeks with a few rounds of showers and thunderstorms that will favor southern and eastern areas. Western Argentina will remain in need of rain to improve conditions for winter wheat. Some of the drier areas in central and southern Cordoba will benefit from light rain Sunday into Wednesday with improvements in soil and winter crop conditions likely temporary. Parts of northern Santa Fe to southern Corrientes will receive up to 0.75" of rain and locally more today. Rain will increase in the south Sunday and will spread into eastern areas Monday into Wednesday.


B La Pampa into Buenos Aires will be wettest and will receive 0.30-1.30" of rain and locally more with lighter rain in the remainder of eastern Argentina and in portions of central and southern Cordoba and San Luis.











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
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
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
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: Warm to hot temperatures will keep evaporation rates high through the first week of the outlook. Some erratic rain will occur; however, this will be unable to counter evaporation outside of a few localized areas. The extreme heat will be limited mostly to the southern half of Europe; however, it will slip into the north again briefly Monday before some additional cooling occurs. The persistent heat in the south will lead to a steady worsening of crop conditions. Some of the hottest temperatures will occur in the Balkan Countries.

AUSTRALIA: Conditions will continue to be favorable the next two weeks. Enough rain is expected to satisfy the needs of crops and enough dry time will occur for fieldwork to advance favorably.









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
