

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


## **United States of America - Weather**


U.S. MIDWEST: Much of the Midwest has adequate soil moisture in place to favorably support late crop development during the next two weeks while warm temperatures and infrequent rain will allow crop maturation to occur mostly favorably as well with today's forecast wetter for the eastern Corn Belt Sunday through Wednesday.


o Some of the lingering dry areas in the west-central and southwestern Corn Belt likely do not have enough soil moisture to favorably support crops, but rain this late in the season would not likely have much of an impact on yields. Showers Sunday into Wednesday in the eastern Corn Belt or rain in much of the Midwest Sep. 10-12 should not cause serious concerns over crop quality declines or delays to fieldwork.

U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: Little rain and favorable conditions for fieldwork will occur for a couple more days in the Delta and the Southeast before a wet weather pattern begins Saturday and continues through Sep. 12 and concerns over crop quality declines may increase while some flooding may occur as well. The southern Delta to Georgia, northern Florida, and western and central South Carolina will be wettest Saturday into Monday.

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
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

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


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# Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

EUROPE: Coverage of meaningful rainfall will increase some in the first week of the outlook and will then likely increase more in the second week. The rain will be beneficial in helping to increase topsoil moisture; however, it will be too late for some crops. An unusually warm temperature bias will continue in the first week followed by cooling in the second week and the combination of cooler temperatures and wetter conditions will lead to a generally less harsh environment. A negative impact of the greater rainfall will be some fieldwork delays that occur.

AUSTRALIA: Favorable conditions will continue in most of the region the next two weeks. In the first week of the outlook, more timely rainfall is expected in Queensland which will raise topsoil moisture. Southeastern production areas in and near Victoria will receive a needed break from the rain. Western Australia will receive some timely rain starting Friday.



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
