
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
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
South Africa - Weather


SOUTH AFRICA: Eastern and central South Africa will continue to have several opportunities for rain through the end of next week. Rainfall will be enough to bolster soil moisture in most locations. Planting of the summer crops may advance slowly in the wettest locations. Establishment and development conditions will otherwise be favorable. Harvesting of winter wheat in Free State may be sluggish in Free State as well.

Western South Africa will only have a few opportunities for spotty rainfall through the end of next week. Winter wheat harvesting will advance swiftly around the rain. • Eastern and central South Africa will see several waves of rain through the end of next week o Rain will evolve on a near daily basis o Moisture totals by next Friday morning will range from 1.50-4.00" with locally greater amounts • Western South Africa will have a few opportunities for erratic rain during the coming week o Pockets in Northern Cape will receive 0.50-1.50" of rain by next Friday morning o Most other locations will not receive enough rain to counter evaporation or impact long-term soil conditions • Eastern and central South Africa will again see a mix of rain and sunshine November 12 – 18 o Western South Africa will receive little to no rain









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
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
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
United States of America - Weather

U.S. MIDWEST: Good harvest progress is expected overall during the next two weeks around a few rounds of precipitation that will ensure favorable conditions for establishment of winter wheat in many areas while some relief from drought occurs in the western Corn Belt. The soil is dry enough that even where heavy rain falls in the western Corn Belt into Saturday delays to fieldwork should not become extended. Temperatures will be much warmer than normal to unseasonably warm through much of the next week from the southwestern to the eastern Corn Belt where highs in the upper 50s to the lower 70s will be most common with some warmer temperatures at times in the south. U.S. DELTA AND SOUTHEAST: The Delta and the Southeast will see a mostly restricted rainfall pattern through the next two weeks and harvesting should advance well overall around rain this evening into Saturday from the Delta to west-central and northern Alabama and rain from southeastern Georgia and nearby Florida to southern Virginia Tuesday into Thursday. Each round of rain will be beneficial for winter crops while causing mostly temporary interruptions to fieldwork along with some discoloration of footbon.









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
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
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
South America - Weather


BRAZIL: Little rain of significance is expected outside of parts of Minas Gerais and Bahia through Wednesday and summer crop planting and winter wheat harvesting should advance swiftly while concerns over dryness may increase for western, central, and southern Brazil and Paraguay. As long as timely rain Thursday through Nov. 12 and follow-up showers Nov. 13-18 occur as advertised most areas should be left with enough soil moisture to favorably support crop development. ARGENTINA: Dry weather and good planting progress will be most common through the next two weeks with showers in the southwest Wednesday into Thursday and rain in much of the country Nov. 11-13 important for many western, central, and northern areas.

o The period of wetter weather Wednesday into Nov. 13 is not likely to result in enough rain to soak the soil in many areas and rain will be needed again soon in many locations.









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
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: A restricted precipitation pattern will continue today and Tuesda


o However, some heavy rain will occur with isolated to scattered rain showers and thunderstorms over southeastern Spain into central Italy and into Bosnia, Montenegro, Albania and southern Serbia and Macedonia.
Moisture totals will vary from 0.75 to 3.00 inches and locally more.


AUSTRALIA: Net drying through the next seven days will still be great for letting the topsoil dry down and for improving crop and field working conditions. Any rain that occurs will be erratic and much of the rain will be light. Temperatures will also continue to trend warmer. River and stream flooding will continue to slowly ease.

Rain is expected to increase in eastern production areas in the second week of the outlook. Significant fieldwork delays are unlikely, although this will be monitored.









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
