



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
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
South Africa - Weather

SOUTH AFRICA: The western half of South Africa will have a few opportunities for spotty rain during the coming week. The precipitation will continue to support a good environment for the winter wheat in Western Cape and Northern Cape. Free State will otherwise not receive enough rain to significantly impact long-term soil conditions. Timely rain would still be welcome to support ideal wheat conditions in the rain-fed areas. Western South Africa will see a mix of erratic rain and sunshine during the coming week o Much of the precipitation will occur this weekend into early next week \(\begin{align*} \text{Moisture} \) totals by next Tuesday morning will range from 0.10-0.75" and local amounts over 1.00" \(\cdot \) Eastern South Africa will be direr biased during the coming week o Any rain that occurs will be lost to evaporation \(\cdot South Africa will have a few opportunities for rain June 28 \(- \) July 4 o Rainfall will be greatest along the western South Africa coastline









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
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
United States of America - Weather


U.S. MIDWEST: Dryness will continue to be a problem in the region through the next seven days. Any meaningful rainfall will be mostly limited to the far southeastern and far northwestern portions of the region; although, some localized pockets of meaningful moisture will occur elsewhere. With temperatures becoming seasonably warm, crop stress is likely to increase from Missouri through eastern lowa, much of Illinois, and into Michigan and southern Wisconsin. A heavy, more generalized rain event is needed.

U.S. DELTA: Too much rain has been falling in the southeastern United States during the past week. Areas that were trending too dry a week ago are now too wet and drying is needed. Rain this week will become greatest in the Carolinas and Virginia resulting in an expansion of the wettest conditions into those areas. All of the southeastern states need a notable bout of drying.









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
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
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
South America - Weather


BRAZIL: Any rain in the next seven days will be mainly in the far south and will be supportive of winter crops from Rio Grande do Sul into southern Parana. Safrinha corn continues to fill and mature with some harvesting under way.

ARGENTINA: Conditions in the next seven days are likely to be mostly favorable; though, more rain is needed in western parts of the nation. Rain in the next seven days will be greatest in eastern areas and soil moisture is lowest in the west. Frost and freeze conditions had a low impact on the nation's crops. Unharvested summer crops were mature and should not have been impacted and winter crops had not serious impact other than slowing emergence and establishment.









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
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
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
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: Some needed rainfall will occur in the northern half of the region in the next seven days which will raise topsoil moisture and reduce crop stress. Much of the south will be trending drier which is also a needed change after recent heavy rain; although, there are a few pockets of the south that could still use more rainfall.

AUSTRALIA: Greater rainfall is needed in Queensland. Some is expected in the first week of the outlook which will be beneficial; however, more will be needed. Conditions in most other areas of the region will be favorable. Weekend frost and freeze conditions were noted in most of the nation's winter crop areas, but the only impact was to slow crop development. Wheat, barley and canola will often become semi-dormant during the heart of winter









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
