



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
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
South Africa - Weather

SOUTH AFRICA: The main winter wheat areas in South Africa will see a good mix of rain and sunshine through the end of next week. Western Cape will receive the greatest amount of rain that will keep soil moisture at adequate to excessive levels. The rain in Northern Cape will help supplement irrigation and maintain good wheat conditions. Rainfall in Free State will not be enough to completely fix the moisture deficits, but will still be welcome for both the rain-fed and irrigated wheat. South Africa will see a mix of erratic rain and sunshine through the end of next week o After a brief period of mostly dry weather today, a disturbance will promote rain for portions of southern South Africa this weekend o Another disturbance will promote more widespread rain next week @ Western Cape will receive 1.00-4.00" of rain and locally greater amounts by next Friday morning @ Eastern Cape, Northern Cape, and portions of Free State and Natal will receive 0.10-1.00" of rain with local amounts up to 2.00" in Eastern Cape @ The remaining locations will receive little to no precipitation • South Africa will be drier biased July 1 – 7 o Light rain will still be possible in southern and western South Africa









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
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
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
United States of America - Weather


U.S. MIDWEST: Crop moisture stress will remain a serious concern over the coming week for the driest areas. Weekend rainfall is expected to be sporadic and mostly too light to change the moisture profile in Illinois, Missouri or immediate neighboring areas. Greater rain will fall across the northern production areas with great relief likely in the Dakotas and parts of Minnesota and Wisconsin. Week two weather will offer some timely rainfall, but there will only be a few areas that get generalized rain of significance. No excessive heat is expected outside of two brief incidents one from Kansas to Illinois this weekend and the other in the same region during the middle to latter part of next week.

U.S. DELTA: Too much rain has been falling in the southeastern United States during the past week. Areas that were trending too dry a week ago are now too wet and drying is needed. Rain this week will become greatest in the Carolinas and Virginia resulting in an expansion of the wettest conditions into those areas. All of the southeastern states need a notable bout of drying.









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
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
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
South America - Weather


BRAZIL: Any rain in the next seven days will be mainly in the far south and will be supportive of winter crops from Rio Grande do Sul into southern Parana. Safrinha corn continues to fill and mature with some harvesting under way.

ARGENTINA: Greater rainfall is still needed in western production areas and is unlikely for a while outside of La Pampa. Conditions in the east are okay for now, but will need a boost in rainfall soon.









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
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
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
Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather


EUROPE: Some needed rainfall will occur in the northern half of the region in the next seven days which will raise topsoil moisture and reduce crop stress. Much of the south will be trending drier which is also a neede change after recent heavy rain; although, there are a few pockets of the south that could still use more rainfall.

AUSTRALIA: A large upper-level low pressure area is likely to move into eastern Australia in the second half of next week and bring some needed rainfall to Queensland. Conditions in most other areas of the region are already favorable and will continue to be mostly good.









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
