
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
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SOUTH AFRICA : South Africa will see a mix of rain and sunshine through the end of next week. Southern South Africa will see a mix of rain and sunshine during the coming week. Areas further north will either be dry or not receive enough rain to impact long-term soil conditions. Winter wheat prospects will remain favorable and no significant quality impacts are expected. South Africa will receive varying amounts of rain during the coming week o Disturbances will promote light rain in pockets of central and southern South Africa through Friday o A frontal boundary will generate more widespread rain this weekend and early next week o Moisture totals by next Tuesday morning will range from 0.75-3.00" and locally greater amounts in Natal, Eastern Cape, and southern Western Cape Will receive 0.10-0.75" of rain @ The remaining locations will receive little to no rain @ South Africa will again have opportunities for rain October 2 – 8 o Precipitation totals will generally be light barring a significant change to the forecast





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United States of America - Weather

U.S. MIDWEST : Additional rain fell from interior west-central Missouri to western to central into southern Illinois to Indiana, parts of western Ohio, and a large part of Kentucky while most other areas were dry and saw improving to favorable conditions for crop maturation and harvesting. Much of the lower and eastern Midwest will see multiple rounds of rain through Monday slowing fieldwork and inducing significant increases in soil moisture that will ensure winter wheat becomes well-established while a large part of the western Corn Belt sees little rain and good harvest nroress

progress. U.S. DELTA : Another day of warm and dry weather occurred in much of the Delta and the Southeast Monday and aggressive harvesting took place in advance of a hurricane expected to impact the region later this week while rain fell on a few northern locations. Potential Tropical Cyclone Nine will make landfall as a hurricane on northwestern Florida Thursday likely producing maximum sustained winds over 100 mph and will cause significant damage to the cotton crop in southern Georgia where cotton will be blown out and where it is not blown out, cotton is likely to be strung out from the boll.










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Europe, New Zealand and Australia - Weather

EUROPE : Rainfall in the next seven days will be too much in some areas leading to fieldwork delays and some more flooding. The greatest rain will be in central and northwestern production areas. Some beneficial rainfall is expected in the central and eastern Balkan Countries. Temperatures later this week will also drop below average in much of the region which will limit evaporation rates. AUSTRALIA : Some beneficial rain shower arctivity is still expected in the first week of the outlook. This will not be enough to fully restore soil moisture after recent dynamics; however, what rain does occur will be beneficial. Queensland, Western Australia and parts of South Australia remain driest. Also, frost and freezes will still occur in the mornings Wednesday through Friday in southeastern production areas, such as Victoria, southeastern South Australia, and southeastern New South Wales. A close watch on temperatures remains warranted, although indications suggest the coldest weather will occur in areas that have either had frost and freezes recently or where crop development has not advanced enough to be seriously harmed by such conditions.



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
